

It is filled with people who live in a world of backyard nature for beauty, martinis for stimulants, and television violence for manifestion of their sexual frustrations. It is filled with people who have never seen a tree, a blade of grass, or a butterfly. It is filled with people who have never stood naked before the stars and cried "I am alive!" This is the world to which they tell us we must sell-out. I say we will not.

And the cry comes from our students, the pawns of education - "make education more relevant." Yet this merely shows the egocentricity of today's youth. What they mean is make it relevant to me! me! me! They must be spoon-fed their facades so that they can fit as a block into the tower of Babal big-daddy capitalism is building. And no one cries "make it relevant to us!"

And nobody has tea parties any more - except us. We are having OUR Boston tea party. The tea is coming from the imperialistic power and it is heavily taxed. We are rocking the boat, throwing the tea overboard; we are saying maybe we will perish without mothers milk, but it is high time we are weaned. We are biting the hand that feeds us, yet we are biting it before it slaps us in the face. I think it is high time we stop giving the outside world what it WANTS and start giving it what we think it NEEDS. This town is exploiting us. The question now is who has the power to do what in this school, who has the power to do what in the community? I ask who has the ability to discuss, who has the ability to exchange ideas, who has the ability to strip himself of his anger so that his friendship can shine through? And yet here we are at war. We are at war in Vietnam because we cannot discuss matters, we cannot even RECOGNIZE the enemy. We are at war here in the university now because we cannot discuss the problems, because the administration cannot RECOGNIZE the students as an entity. We must think in terms of power - the students are pawns, the faculty the knights, and bishops, and the administration are the kings and queens. The question now is "can one checkmate a king with a pawn?" Why must this be the question? Our beloved chancellor, in his inauguration speech, spoke of arming students with education; power for the outside world. Never a word about beauty was uttered by the chancellor of one of the most beautiful institutions in the country - beautiful in its newness, beautiful in its art, beautiful in its music, beautiful in its freedom.

Last Thursday was the first sign I have seen of beauty in this university; we had a beautiful meeting in that everyone could speak on the same level deans with students, department chairmen with faculty - openly, nakedly. ## While Waiting For The Jury

Many lawyers and legal philosophers can find little good in our system of justice, the jury system. Supposedly a group of peers, the jury usually tends to be composed of lower middle class, non-professional people. The best minds in any given community rarely, if ever, serve on a jury. As a consequence, the complex mass of evidence that must be sorted out, even in the simplest of trials, too often goes unexamined.

There is, however, an answer to these critics. One must not necessarily subject oneself to a jury trial. The court will try a case if the defendent so desires. In other words, the judge acts as a jury too. He determines the facts on the basis of evidence presented, and then applies his knowledge of the law to these facts.

There are always flaws in a system which puts the totality of power in one pair of hands. This was obvious enough to the framers of the United States Constitution that they allowed for a complex system of checks and balances in the government. That these checks and balances do not always work is not necessarily the fault of their creators, and is certainly not the concern here.

The shortcomings of trial by the court might be overcome by a three judge panel, which would take into account some of the complexities of a trial, bring to bear a consummate knowledge of the law, and minimize the individual functionary's power, upon which this country has always cast a jaundiced eye. The state however, will not brook the expense of a panel of judges presiding over a court, even if it be in the interests of an improved judicial process,

and a probable concomitant qualitative increase in justice.

It must be remembered that a concept of justice is dependent upon a clearly delineated truth. No system can defeat the perjured witness, who will not hesitate to report a situation the way he wishes he had seen it

The thought that an oath administered to a witness before his testimony will cause him to tell the truth as he knows it to be is plainly naive, and as such, is an indictment of our entire court system. Even more naive is the belief that once the various principals concerned have given their testimony under oath, the truth must somehow emerge from the morass, as a gallant white charger victorious from the fray.

We are thus presented with the insoluble problem of establishing the truth. Assuming that people will continue to lie, in spite of exhortations to the contrary, we are left with the problem of determining wherein lies justice.

It seems apparent that our concept of justice, as being inexorably bound up in truth somehow, is useless. The reality of "justice" today is in no way connected with the truth, and any resemblance to the concept is purely coincidental.

It seems that if the Establishment wishes to maintain any semblance of respect for the legislative and judicial branches of government, it ought to strive to establish anew a code of real justice, which may be in line with the grade-school history book heritage of the country, a tradition fraught with lies, but still attractive in many aspects.

# The Recognition

### Of North Vietnam

Within this past week Sweden became the first Western nation to recognize the government in North Vietnam. In doing so she has taken a major step in the realization that Communism is here today, and that the United States with all its military strength and attempted aggression against these nations will not dictate policies to its western allies. It is time for the world to grow up, or as the Broadway song urges, "to take its medicine." The Pueblo incidence of last year was a total diplomatic farce, with the United States not acknowledging the government in North Korea, and signing a statement that though we were in forbidden waters we really were not. Only through the recognition of all Communist nations, and the admittance of them to the United Nations can we ever hope to achieve a working relations that may, though not necessarily so, bring peace into our troubled times. Everything that Western man is taught to hold sacred in a Democratic form of government is deprived to the South Vietnamese by its government which we recognized. Several months ago a South Vietnamese newspaper published the United States reasons for the bombing halt in bolder type than their government's condemnation of it. The paper was immediately suspended for a period of time which would cause its ultimate death--yet we acknowledge this government, support it, and by its damned whims dying for it. If we can support this form of tyranny, then surely we can acknowledge the Communist nations in this world.


"Every man is free, but most men fearing the consequences and responsibilities of freedom, refuse to acknowledge its presence in themselves and would deny it to others."

#### Core City

Dear Jack,

This letter is in response to the recipients of the core city scholarships who wrote in protest against the Bursar's office:

First of all, may I strongly agree with your statements concerning the incompetence and sad inefficiency of the Bursar's office. That office is in dire need of either some real organization, a new and competent staff, or both. I have found from an experience of my own that one end of the office is often ignorant of what the other end is doing -- that no one is realmanding various sums of money, yet no clear explanation is given as to WHY the parents are being billed; and, if the reason for the bill is questioned, the person gets the old administrative run-around and enough looks to kill. It seems that the administration is merely trying to get its hands on as much money as it can with as little valid reason as possible. This is indeed unfair. The office has been no less unfair, inept, and insulting in your case. I sympathize with you on the basis of my personal experience (although I realize that your problem is more serious).

I do not agree, however, with your statements calling the Bursar's actions as a "crystal clear act of racism." Your claim that the administration is acting in a racist manner is in itself a racist claim. The Bursar's office is indeed guilty of "mistakes and misdeeds," but certainly not against Blacks only, as you would come

to realize if you would only maintain an open mind and, with it, a sense of your own individuality. I agree that you as Black people have been treated with indignity by the white race in general, and you and I both realize that this situation is not improving fast enough. I am white, and I am not denying that I see a color difference between you and me; but I also realize that color is the ONLY human difference between us, and that it shouldn't be the cause of any new and false ones. And you must try to accept the fact that many other whites are working very hard at achieving the same attitude (or one that is even better). But unfortunately, it takes a long time for the attitudes of a nation to make such a radical change, and not until attitudes change will there be any meaningful results. But it is not only the attitudes of the WHITES that must change -- yours must begin to change now also.

It seems that the "integration" that you and I both worked so hard for is the very thing that you are now rejecting as being not enough and relatively undesirable. Because we are all human, we should all enjoy the same rights and privileges. You certainly have every right to demand the same rights and powers that whites now exercise. But, as we had no right to deprive you of them in the first place, you have no right to claim UNequal rights in the form of special and unfair (both to you and to me) considerations merely because you are Black. If you will forget your group alliances for a moment and think this out rationally, I think you will agree. Don't lower yourself to the level of white inhumanity. Think as an individual don't lose your sense of self and your individual and HEART-FELT beliefs in irrational group persuasions which are all too often the results of impulsive passions let loose without reason, Harsh and irrational words and actions only INTENSIFY racism; they reverse the progress made through peaceful and WISE actions. You might as well resign yourself to the fact that genuine brotherhood is not going to be achieved in our generation or perhaps even in the next one. It's a hard fact, and it takes courage to face it. But the time to start is NOW. Put your efforts into constructive and peaceful actions for the benefit of generations to come -- don't be futilely selfish and ruin everything that has been accomplished so far. After all, that's what you're here to learn. Black racism is not going to dispel white racism.

#### "Over Forty"

I am in favor of four letter words
-- when they are "love" and "care," love that helps and allows all men to develop to their fullest potential: that is neither parasitic nor voracious nor manipulative. I approve of "care" or concern when it involves also, responsibility; respect for all affected and perspective!

I suggest that your "Liberated" News is a sad little paper; that it misses by the hairs on your heads (and chins!) a golden opportunity to bring into alignment your own contemporaries now outside the pale of your alleged commitment and the legion of overforty, fellow humans (yes Virginia, we ARE human) who have a parallel sensitivity to your alleged motivations. Over forty is not ALL "hamburger and TV; even those of us who are "culturally deprived" because we have to work for a living,

How many of you really believe that you would have done any better than the "establishment" in the same circumstances; did it ever occur to you that a large segment of the population of this country have been too BUSY to bring about a condition of paradise? It is also the failures of individuals who make up the establishment; that you cannot condemn any Nation collectively! There are no labels that fit collectively -- only individually. . . . make the world better -- starting with ME! This is the ONLY way it will ever BE better -- not by knocking all existing institutions as if there were no good in them, but by judicial promotion of constructive changes; by "starting with ME;" by noiseless but evident constancy; and by self-discipline, not self indulgence! We are all searching for that Utopia of equality but we cannot find it separately and we will not find it if we fragmentize our world. No one and nothing is unconnected.

A man is worth only as much as those things are worth that he busies himself with; What's your Four letter words? hangup? Nudity? Obscenity? Promiscuity? Why? They have nothing to do with truth -- genuine communication or confrontation, and truth doesn't need to be punctuated with obscenity; it stands by itself. Ages will come and go and mountains will drop into the sea but truth will never die or go out of style.

What is "liberating" about a nude photo of Lennon and Ono? What are you trying to prove? All you HAVE proved is, that ANYTHING can get its picture in the Liberated Press. I'm sure however, that many of you have parents with just as "artistic" anatomies; why don't you give them preference over two who have had more than their share of publicity? While we're liberating; let's liberate equality of opportunity in all spheres. Don't be so selfish!

#### No Power

It came as a great shock to me to learn that Dr. Eugene T. Sweeney, recently appointed director of student relations at the University of Hartford, had suspended publication of the UH NEWS LIBERATED PRESS. It came as a shock because he has not the power to make any decision whatsoever in the matter.

The Student Faculty Association Constitution, which was written and approved by the Board of Regents some eight years ago, commands that one of the S.F.A. Cabinet's permanent standing committees, the Publications Commission, "be responsible for all student publications in the University." This commission, after acting, has each and every one of its decisions approved by the Cabinet as a whole.

In assuming its responsibility for student publications, it has been the practice of the Student Faculty Association to appropriate funds from its own budget to pay for the total costs of publication. In the some eight years that this has been going on, publication costs have been paid through University Purchase Orders drawn on the Student Faculty Association account in the business office. Costs of publication will continue to be met in that manner.

A memo addressed to me from Mr. Charles T. Dwight, Treasurer of the University, dated September 30, 1968, states, "Requisitions and invoices will be honored by the University Business Office upon the signature of either the SFA President or Treasurer." Since the UH NEWS LIBERATED PRESS has not exceeded its financial allocation for this year, either Mr. Attenborough or myself will as a matter of course sign any duly authorized Purchase Order, and forward it to the business office, where I trust neither Dr. Sweeney nor Mr. Pilkonis will make a liar out of the University Treasurer.

In the event that the University Business Office refuses payment on a signed purchase order, I have already been in communication with several lawyers concerning legal recourse in forcing the University to live up to the Charter granted to the S.F.A. by the Board of Regents.

I am also instructing Mr. Hardy, editor of the UH NEWS, and Mr. Feld, its business manager, to disregard any further attempts at meddling with their publication schedule.

Since at least one public prosecutor thinks that, as President of the S.F.A., I am legally responsible as publisher, I deem it appropriate to begin acting as such. Therefore, I hereby give my assurances that neither the publication of the paper nor the payment of its bills will be in any way interpreted.

# "Faces": Cassavette's Excursion Into Absurdity

John Cassavette's "Faces" tries to probe a psychological condition without attempting to penetrate the individuals involved. The central plot is the failure of the middle class to come to terms with sex, thus resulting in the most disastrous collection of incompetence since Walt Disney created half naked ducks. Although the plot had the potential of being an exceptional movie, Cassavette destroyed this hope with a combination of ludicrous characters, acting, dialogues, and sets.

The main problem when dealing with a movie such as "Faces" is the question whether the director is trying to present or distort reality. When I speak of presenting reality, I realize the necessity of positive distortions such as color, camera actions, lighting, symbols, flashbacks, etc.; however, the main effect of such positive distortions would be a reality in which the audience can relate to it through some positive emotional response indicative of their daily lives. If the audience can feel some projection into an emotional response which is the direct by-product of the film's reality, and then transcend the superficial reality of the film to the reality of their lives, then this is a successful presentation of reality. Even if that emotion takes the form of a negative statement such as hatred for a character, or a total disgust with the film's reality, this would merit it as a presentation of reality; the main point is that their disgust must be a by-product resulting from their relationship to the movie's reality, and not simply with the movie as a movie. A distortion of reality is a negative

A distortion of reality is a negative statement evolving from the positive reality originally presented. If a movie takes a positive statement such as war, and in their interpretation destroys the thin line separating reality and fantasy thus throwing the whole film into a predetermined over-statement (which can have a positive value by creating a completely new reality-fantasy which the audience has not experienced before,) this would be a successful distortion. In such a movie, realistic emotional response can't be stimulated as successfully as a realistic presentation could because a new environment and situation has been produced which is alien to man's natural life; such distortions are usually presented in musicals.

If a movie deems it necessary to incorporate both traits, remaining partly realistic and partly the distortions of, it is treading on very thin grounds. To retain an even conflict between both opposing forces can make for an extremely impressive film; however the chances are more than favorable that it will fail because it could not retain the balanced conflict. This is what happens to "Faces."

Cassavette's main fault was his presentation of extremities which ran completely into absurdities, all in the name of presenting reality. His characters are ugly, successful middle class businessmen who, in order to relate sexually to women, find it necessary to regress back to the emotional level of an infant. The agony of middle class frustration is portrayed as a semi-ritualistic ceremony incorporating ludicrous dancing, joking, cursing, and recitation of "Peter Pepper pick a peck of pickled peppers..." It was not the fact that they performed these feats which repels you; it is their continuous redundancies which repels you. If these feats could have been portrayed in a more respected and subtle fashion, the movie would have been a greater success. What Cassavette doesn't realize is that a whisper can be more dramatic and startling than a shout. However, Cassavette continues to shout, and the movie fails.

What all the successful middle class business men are after is a whore named Jeanne. Her name invites the banal singing of "I Dream of Jeanne," and Cassavette gives it to us, over and over. Her psychological problem is the fact that she is a whore but she won't admit it; that's about all we learn about her in the whole movie.

Cassavette also made the mistake of making a generalized statement concerning the behavior of the middle class, and stuck to it throughout the movie. He did not give us individuals with degrees of differentiation; he produced one stereotype and repeated him in every character. Every man that came to see Jeanne was identical to the point of absurdity; this fact almost lead me out of the theatre before the flick was finished.

# The Addict & Daytop Village

(ed. note: The following is a speech delivered by John Governale, a student of the University of Hartford. Because of its social significance, we are publishing it here for our readers.)

Good morning-I'm here this morning to tell you about a solution, rather than open your eyes to some new problem. My solution is Daytop Village, the problem is drug addiction.

In pursuit of heroin a junkie is able to muster extra-ordinary cunning, shrewdness and acting ability-usually, he is untouched by normal therapeutic approaches. For a junkie, treatment is a game, an arena for practicing his confidence and skills. Daytop Village on New York's Staten Island is where he loses that game, but where he also wins a share of self respect.

Conventional methods of treating drug addicts have been grossly ineffective. For example, follow up studies of addicts in the U.S. Public Health Service Hospitals in Lexington, Kentucky, and in Fort Worth, Texas, reveal that more than 90% of released patients relapse into addiction within a few years. The change agent most likely to be effective with the junkie, is another addict who has made a committment to change himself, one who is prepared to use himself as a role model and become involved with his "brothers."

When a professional therapist attempts to communicate with the junkie, he is simply turned off: you'll hear him say something like, "what the hell does this dumb bastard know, why is he talking to me, he doesn't know what its like to be high-he's never been there!" When you're a junkie, you see nothing as your

fault-not your addiction, not your degradation-nor your desperation. An addict is convinced he has been thrown into life without the armor and weapons that others have-heroin enables you to escape from the unfair battle--it deadens the junkie's desire for friends, for achievement, for wealth, for strenght, for sex and even for food-the satisfactions you so relentlessly seek, the junkie obtains, for a short time anyway, with a \$5 bag of heroin. The Daytop intake process is organized to challenge the applicant's sincerity to break the habit. When some nice kind-hearted Social Worker or someone telephones Daytop in an effort to smooth the admission of a "worthy" case, he is politely advised to have the addict apply himself.

The applicant must be over 16 years old and not a pill head. When withdrawal takes place outside the hospital, Daytop personnel consider the barbiterate, Amphetemine, and Methadrine addict to be in far greater danger than the Heroin addict. In any case, the addict must telephone himself to arrange for admission to Daytop-when the junkie does call he is told that Daytop is crowded, many addicts are clamoring to get in, and space is limited. But if he is really interested; he may call again the next day. If he "forgets" and calls a day late, he is told his name is being put at the bottom of the list-when he is told to call again and he does, he is commended for his interest and told to call again a day later. If this committment is kept, he is invited to present himself at Daytop Village, clean of drugs for at least one day-some applicants go through a half

dozen telephone calls before they receive an invitation. There is a rationale for this apparently hostile and heartless system-few addicts are motivated for therapy and change.

Treatment is usually portrays each character in such extremes that he destroys their reality. We are not alienated from them for this would have been a positive emotional response; what we do is to totally discard them as we

The women were also in stereotype; they all ran after the same male prostitute; one of them got him into bed and then made a poor attempt at suicide. The houses were all overly decorated and cheap.

The extremity of absurdity throughout this movie destroys any possibility of relating to any of the characters. Each exist in their own dream world; however, Cassavette does not give us the conflict of the real and the dream worlds. He

would garbage -- without any regrets what-so-ever.

When I searched the title for an explanation, I had hoped the viewer would be able to delve deeply into the faces for a brilliant betrayal of the characters; Cassavette doesn't allow this. The conversations are so mediocre that again we can't understand the personalities of the characters. "Faces" was probably meant to mean that each character had many masks or faces and thus played many roles; it just didn't materialize. Even though I have found so much criticism with this movie, I would advise people to see it. It is an interesting attempt even though it's a resounding failure.

## The Time Has Come Today

There comes a time in the history of all established institutions when the reputation of that institution must stand aside to allow criticism to pass in.

The consensus at Hartt College is that the students should have a substantial system which they could use to affect a teacher's capabilities. The system I propose is a grading system that will entertain the same education objectives for the teacher as the objectives used in grading the student. College administrations have spent too much time appreciating the illusion that once he has obtained a graduate degree, formal education is dispensed with for him, thus, formal grades will be dispensed with concordantly. What the professor does not realize is that his teacher education begins when he walks into a classroom to teach that this situation is analogous to the student who begins his formal education when he walks into a college classroom. The point here is that the teacher and student stimulate an education interaction that

the lesser of two evils to the junkie. He comes to Daytop because he thinks it is "easier time" than jail, or because there's a panic in the streets and no drugs are around anyway, or because he has been kicked out of the house by his wife-but permanently give up the use of junk? Impossible! or so he reasons.

Every step of the Daytop intake procedure is designed to shock the addict into realizing that his place is basically different from the other agencies he has learned to manipulate. Here he will not be indulged like a spoiled child, here his usual con-games won't work. When the addict arrives at Daytop, he is admitted to the reception area and told to sit on the "prospest" chair, and wait until he is called. Meanwhile, his parents are taken next door and given counsel that at first seems harsh and unbelievable. They are told that their child will be treated and surrounded by all ex-junkies for a year to two. They are told to make themselves as cold, as hostile and rejecting as they can towards their son or daughter. They demand that if they are called, to hang up. If a letter is sneaked out, to return it unopened to Daytop. And if the junkie suddenly turns up home with tales of the abuse he suffered at the Village-to slam the door in his face.

Meantime the addict waits impatiently in the other room, up to four hours-then the interviewers finally arrive and begin right in on him. They tell him that dispite his physical size and age, he is a baby in terms of maturity, responsibility and judgement. But for the time being he must act as if he were a man-act as if he cared about other people-and to act as if he were a human being. At Daytop they don't spend time trying to find the essential cause of addiction. That whole process would be expolited by the junkie. The only acceptable explanation for addiction is copping out-stupidity. Everybody at the Village tries to live as openly and as honestly as possible. Everybody in the house, from the director to the girl at the reception desk, has at one time been a junkie.

There's no "we versus they" situations-everybody is a member of the staff, and that's the main difference in

is separable only because of the function of student-teacher or vice-versa but not because an education experience terminates with becoming a teacher. In an educational system such as this where learning is an experience common to both teacher and student it is only consistent with American Democratic Policy that similar laws apply to similar affectations.

We all understand that there is a greater probability that students can learn more if the teacher can teach more. The time is here for the solution to the problem of under-achievement of teaching capacity at Hartt to be remedied by the same system that reprimands student under-achievement.

The time has come today to implement a grading system to affect the faculty. This grading system will be initiated this semester and the evidence will be limited to any University student having a formal educational experience at Hartt. The grades will be published in the Liberated Press.

treatment from other institutions. And the authority is in a peer group situation.... there is no job a junkie can't aim for-even director. In fact there are only two cardinal rules of the house: no chemicals and no violence or even the threat of violence-no excuse is accepted for breaking either of these two basic rules. If he does he is thrown out.

One of the principal methods for achieving self-image and behavioral change is the three times a week group encounter therapy. During this time the building echoes with ear-piercing screams, curses, tears and laughter. When listening from the outside, it makes you feel a little sick, a little scared. Gutter language explodes from the rooms--one member after another is assigned to the "hot seat" where he is attacked and criticized for failing himself; for being less than 100% honest; for being insensitive to the feelings of others. The encounter is called a pressure cooker.

David Deitch, the 35 year old director says the resident cannot use profanity at anytime except during the encounter. He cannot act moody, or irritable or become self- pitying between encounters. He has to act as if, and wait until after the meetings to get all the garbage out.

The greatest number of dropouts in the program occure during the first 30 days. About 8% who come through the front door leave immediately or within a month. The great majority remain for three months when another critical period is reached. Approximately 17% will split after 90 days. According to Dr.

Daniel Casriel, medical Psychiatric director of Daytop, the addict who remains 3 months, has better than a 75% chance of completing the program and emerging as a new vibrant human being.

BUT, UNFORTUNATELY MY FRIENDS, DAYTOP HAS BEEN CLOSED. It seems the communities don't want places such as this in their midst. It seems they refuse to correct a situation they as parents and people helped to create. This reaction is intolerable. Our society needs Daytop. Our society must support agencies that exist to correct their mistakes.

# "HEAD HERO" AWARD

times a year someone may go on holiday to the seashore or how many pretty imported things can be bought with present wages. It is rather that the individual feels greater fulfillment, that he has greater inner wealth and many more responsibilities. In our country the individual knows that the glorious period in which it has fallen to him to live is one of sacrifice; he is familiar with sacrifice.

The fist came to know it in the Sierra Maestra, and wherever there was fighting; later, we have known it in all Cuba. Cuba is the vanguard of America and must make sacrifices because it occupies the advance position, because it points out to the Latin American masses the road to full freedom.

Within the country, the leaders have to fulfill their vanguard role; and it must be said with complete sincerity that in a true revolution, to which you give yourself completely without any thought for material retribution, the task of the vanguard revolutionary is both magnificent and anguishing.

Let me say, with the risk of appearing ridiculous, that the true revolutionary is guided by strong feelings of love. It is impossible to think of an authentic revolutionary without this quality. This is perhaps one of the great dramas of a leader; he must combine an impassioned spirit with a cold mind and make painful decisions without flinching. Our vanguard revolutionaries must idealize their love for the people, for the most hallowed causes, and make it one a and indivisible. They cannot descend, with small doses of

daily affection, to the terrain where ordinary men put their love into practice.

In these conditions, the revolutionary leaders must have a large dose of humanity, a large dose of a sense of justice and truth to avoid falling into dogmatic extremes, into cold scholasticism, into isolation from the masses. They must struggle every day so that their love of living humanity is transformed into concrete deeds, into acts that will serve as an example, as a mobilizing factor.

It is evident that there are dangers in the present circumstances. Not only that of dogmatism, not only that of the freezing up of relations with the masses in the midst of the great task; there also exists the danger of weakness in which it is possible to incur. If a man thinks that in order to devote his entire life to the revolution, he cannot be distracted by the worry that one of his children lacks a certain article, that the children's shoes are in poor condition, that his family lacks some necessary item, with this reasoning, the seeds of future corruption are allowed to filter through.

In our case, we have maintained that our children must have, or lack, what the children of the ordinary citizen have or lack; our family must understand this and struggle for it. The revolution is made by man, but man must forge his revolutionary spirit from day to day.

Thus we go forward. Fidel is at the head of the immense column--we are neither ashamed nor afraid to say so--followed by the best Party cadres and right after them, so close that their great strength is felt, come the people as a whole, a solid bulk of individualities moving towards a common aim; individuals who have achieved the awareness of what must be done; men who struggle to leave the domain of necessity and enter that of freedom.

That immense multitude is ordering itself; its order responds to an awareness of the need for order; it is no longer a dispersed force, divisible in thousands of

fractions shot into space like the fragments of a grenade, trying by any and all means, in a fierce struggle with their equals, to achieve a position that would give them support in the face of an uncertain future.

We know that we have sacrifices ahead of us and that we must pay a price for the heroic fact of constituting a vanguard as a nation. We the leaders know that we must pay a price for having the right to say that we are at the hear of the people that is at the head of America.

## man and socialism, in cuba

(ed. note: MAN AND SOCIALISM IN CUBA is a well written account of modern Cuba, as seen through the eyes of the late Che Guevara, one of Cuba's finest revolutionaries.)

#### dear comrade:

Am finishing these notes while traveling through Africa, moved by the desire to keep my promise, although after some delay. I should like to do so by dealing with the topic that appears in the title. I believe it might be of interest to Uruguayan

It is common to hear how capitalist spokesmen use as an argument in the ideological struggle against socialism the assertion that such a social system or the period of building socialism upon which we have embarked, is characterized by the extinction of the individual for the sake of the State. I will make no attempt to refute this assertion on a merely theoretical basis, but will instead establish the facts of the Cuban experience and add commentaries of a general nature. I shall first broadly sketch the history of our revolutionary struggle both before and after

As we know, the exact date of the beginning of the revolutionary actions which were to culminate on January 1, 1959, was July 26, 1953. A group of men led by Fidel Castro attacked the Moncada military garrison in the province of Oriente, in the early hours of the morning of that day. The attack was a failure, the failure became a disaster and the survivors were imprisoned, only to begin the revolutionary struggle all over again, once they were amnestied.

During this process, which contained only the first seeds of socialism, man was a basic factor. Man-individualized, specific, named-was trusted and the triumph or failure of the task entrusted to him depended on his capacity for action.

Then came the stage of guerrilla warfare. It was carried out in two different environments: the people, an as yet unawakened mass that had to be mobilized, and its vanguard, the guerrilla, the thrusting engine of mobilization, the generator of revolutionary awareness and militant enthusiasm. This vanguard was the catalyst which created the subjective condition necessary for victory. The individual was also the basic factor in the guerrilla, in the framework of the gradual proletarianization of our thinking, in the revolution taking place in our habits and

It was the first heroic period in which man strove to earn posts of greater responsibility, of greater danger, with the fulfillment of their duty as the only satisfaction. In our revolutionary educational work, we often return to this instructive topic. The man of the future could be glimpsed in the attitude of our

The Revolutionary Government was established in 1959 with the participation of several members of the "sell-out" bourgeoisie. The presence of the Rebel Army constituted the guarantee of power as the fundamental factor of strength.

Serious contradictions arose which were solved in the first instance in February, 1959, when Fidel Castre assumed the leadership of the government in the post of prime minister. This process culminated in July of the same year with the resignation of President Urrutia in the face of mass pressure.

With clearly defined features, there now appeared in the history of the Cuban Revolution a personage which wil systematically repeat itself: the masses.

#### full and accurate interpretation

This multifacetic being is not, as it is claimed, the sum total of elements of the same category (and moreover, reduced to the same category by the system imposed upon them) and which acts as a tame herd. It is true that the mass follows its leaders, especially Fidel Castro, without hesitation, but the degree to which he has earned such confidence is due precisely to the consummate interpretation of the people's desires and aspirations, and to the sincere struggle to keep the promises

The mass participated in the Agrarian Reform and in the difficult undertaking of the management of the state enterprises; it underwent the heroic experience of Playa Giron; it was tempered in the struggle against the groups of bandits armed by the CIA; during the October Crisis it lived one of the most important definitions of modern times and today it continues the work to build socialism.

Looking at things from a superficial standpoint, it might seem that those who . speak of the submission of the individual to the State are right; with incomparable enthusiasm and discipline, the mass carries out the tasks set by the

government whatever their nature: economic, cultural, defense, sports, etc.

However, the State at times makes mistakes. When this occurs, the collective enthusiasm diminishes palpably as a result of a quantitative diminishing that takes place in each of the elements that make up the collective, and work becomes paralyzed until it finally, shrinks to insignificant proportions; this is the time to rectify.

This was what happened in March 1962, in the presence of the sectarian policy imposed on the Party by Anibal Escalante.

This mechanism is obviously not sufficient to ensure a sequence of sensible measures; what is missing is a more structured relationship with the mass. We must improve this connection in the years to come, but for now, in the case of the initiatives arising on the top levels of government, we are using the almost intuitive method of keeping our ears open to the general reactions in the face of the problems that are posed.

What is hard to understand for anyone who has not lived the revolutionary experience is that close dialectical untiy which exists between the individual and the mass, in which both are interrelated, and the mass, as a whole composed of individuals, is in turn interrelated with

Under capitalism, certain phenomena of this nature can be observed with the appearance on the scene of politicians capable of mobilizing the public, but if it is not an authentic social movement in which case it is not completely accurate to speak of capitalism, the movement will have the same life span as its promoter or until the rigors of capitalist society put an end to popular illusions. Under capitalism, man is guided by a cold ordinance which is usually beyond his comprehension. The alienated human individual is bound to a society as a whole by an invisible umbilical cord: the law of value. It acts upon all facets of his life, shaping his road and his destiny.

### the invisible laws of capitalism

The laws of capitalism, invisible and blind for most people, act upon the individual without his awareness. He sees only the broadness of an horizon that appears infinite. Capitalist propaganda

presents it in just this way, and attempts to use the Rockefeller case (true or not) as a lesson in the prospects for success. The misery that must be accumulated for such an example to arise and the sum total of baseness contributing to the formation of a fortune of such magnitude do not appear in the picture, and the popular forces are not always able to make these concepts clear. (It would be fitting at this point to study how the workers of the imperialist countries gradually lose thier international class spirit under the influence of a certain complicity in the exploitation of the dependent countries and how this fact at the same time wears away the militant spirit of the masses within their own national context, but this topic is outside the framework of the present note).

I shall now attempt to define the individual, the actor in this strange and moving drama that is the building of socialism, in his two-fold existence as a unique being and a member of the

community.

I believe that the simplest approach is to recognize his un-made quality: he is an unfinished product. The flaws of the past are translated into the present in the individual consciousness and constant efforts must be made to eradicate them. The process is two-fold: on the one hand society acts upon the individual by means of direct and indirect education, while on the other hand, the individual undergoes a conscious phase of self-education.

The new society in the process of formation has to compete very hard with the past. This makes itself felt not only in the individual consciousness, weighed down by residues of an education and an upbringing systematically oriented towards the isolation of the individual, but also by the very nature of this transition period, with the persistence of commodity relations. The commodity is the economic cell of capitalist society; as long as it exists, its effects will make themselves felt in the organizations of production and therefore in man's consciousness.

Marx's scheme conceived of the transition period as the result of the explosive transformation of the capitalist system torn apart by its inner contradictions; subsequent reality has shown how some countries, the weak limbs, detach themselves from the imperialist tree, a phenomenon foreseeu by Lenin. In those countries, capitalism has developed sufficiently to make its effects felt upon the people in one way or another, but it is not its own inner contradictions that explode the system after exhausting all of its possibilities. The struggle for liberation against an external oppressor, the misery which has its origin in foreign causes, such as war whose consequences make thy privileged classes fall upon the exploited, the liberation movements aimed at overthrowing neo-colonial regimes, are the customary factors in this process. Conscious action does the rest

### a rapid change without sacrifice

In these countries there still has not been achieved a complete education for the work of society, and wealth is far from being within the reach of the masses through the simple process of appropriation. Underdevelopment and the customary flight of capital to "civilized" countries make impossible a rapid change without sacrifices. There still remains a long stretch to be covered in the building of the economic base and the temptation to follow the beaten paths of material interest as the lever of speedy development, is very great.

There is a danger of not seeing the forest because of the trees. Pursuing the chimera of achieving socialism with the

aid of the blunted weapons left to us by capitalism (the commodity as the economic cell, profitability and individual material interest as levers, etc.), it is possible to come to a blind alley. And the arrival there comes about after covering a long distance where there are many crossroads and where it is difficult to realize just when the wrong turn was taken. Meanwhile, the adapted economic base has undermined the development of consciousness. To build communism, a new man must be created simultaneously with the material base.

That is why it is so important to choose correctly the instrument of mass mobilization. That instrument must be fundamentally of a moral character, without forgetting the correct use of material incentives, especially those of a social nature.

### society must be a huge school

As I already said, in moments of extreme danger it is easy to activate moral incentives; to maintain their effectiveness, it is necessary to develop a consciousness in which values acquire new categories. Society as a whole must become a huge school.

The broad characteristics of the phenomenon are similar to the process of formation of capitalist consciousness in the system's first stage. Capitalism resorts to force but it also educates people in the system. Direct propaganda is carried out by those who are entrusted with the task of explaining the inevitablity of a class regime, whether it be of divine origin or due to the imposition of nature as a mechanical entity. This placates the masses, who see themselves oppressed by an evil against which it is not possible to struggle.

This is followed by hope, which differentiates copitalism from the previous caste regimes that offered no way out. For some, the caste formula continues in force: the obedient are rewarded by the POST MORTEM arrival in other wonderful worlds where the good are requited, and the old tradition is continued. For others, innovation: the division in classes is a matter of fate, but individuals can leave the class to which they belong through work, initiative, etc. This process, and that of self-education for success, must be deeply hypocritical; it is the interested demonstration that a

In our case, direct education acquires much greater importance. Explanations are convenient because they are genuine; subterfuges are not needed. It is carried

out through the State's educational apparatus in the form of general, technical and ideological culture, by means of bodies such as the Ministry of Education and the Party's information apparatus. Education takes among the masses and the new attitude that is praised tends to become habit; the mass gradually takes it over and exerts pressure on those who have still not become educated. This is the indirect way of educating the masses, as powerful as the other structured, one.

But the process is a conscious one; the individual receives the impact of the new social power and perceives that he is not completely adequate to it Under the influence of the pressure implied in indirect education, he tries to adjust to a situation that he feels to be just and whose lack of development has kept him from doing so thus far. He is educating -

We can see the new man who begins to emerge in this period of the building of socialism. His image is as yet unfinished; in fact it will never be finished, since the process advances parallel to the development of new economic forms.

What is important is that people become more aware every day of the need to incorporate themselves into society and of their own importance as motors of that society.

# a long and difficult road

The road is long and full of difficulties. At times, the route strays off course and it is necessary to retreat; at times, a too rapid pace separates us from the masses and on occasions the pace is slow and we feel upon our necks the breath of those who follow upon our heels. Our ambition as revolutionaries makes us try to move forward as far as possible, opening up the way before us, but we know that we must be reinforced by the mass, while the mass will be able to advance more rapidly if we encourage it by our example.

In spite of the importance given to moral incentives, the existence of two principal groups (excluding, of course, the minority fraction of those who do not participate for one reason or another in the building of socialism) is an indication of the relative lack of development of social consciousness. The vanguard group is ideologically more advanced than the mass; the latter is acquainted with the new values, but insufficiently. While in the former a qualitative change takes place which permits them to make sacrifices as a function of their vanguard character, the latter see only by halves and must be subjected to incentives and pressures of some intensity; it is the dictatorship of the proletariat being exercised not only upon the defeated class but also individually upon the victorious class.

To achieve total success, all of this involves the necessity of a series of mechanisms, the revolutionary institutions. The concept of institutionalization fits in with the images of the multitudes marching towards the future as that of a harmonic unit of canals, steps, well-oiled apparatuses that make the march possible, that permit the natural selection of those who are destined to march in the vanguard and who dispense rewards and punishments to those who fulfill their duty or act against the society under construction.

The institutionality of the Revolution has still not been achieved. We are seeking something new that will allow a perfect identification between the government and the community as a whole, adapted to the special conditions of the building of socialism and avoiding to the utmost the commonplaces of bourgeois democracy transplanted to the society in formation (such as legislative houses, for example).

Some experiments have been carried out with the aim of gradually creating the institutionalization of the Revolution, but without too much hurry. We have been greatly restrained by the fear that any formal aspect might make us lose sight of the ultimate and most important revolutionary asperation: to see man freed from alienation.

Not with standing the lack of institutions, which must be overcome gradually, the masses now make history as a conscious aggregate of individuals who struggle for the same cause. In spite of the apparent standardization of man in socialism, he is more complete; his possibilities for expressing himself and making himself heard in the social apparatus are infinitely greater, in spite of the lack of a perfect mechanism to do so.

It is still necessary to accentuate his conscious, individual and collective, participation in all the mechanisms of direction and production and associate it with the idea of the need for technical and ideological education, so that the individual will realize that these processes

are closely interdependent and their advances are parallel. He will thus achieve total awareness of his social being, which is equivalent to his full realization as a human being, having broken the chains of alienation.

This will be translated concretely into the reappropriation of his nature through freed work and the expression of his own human condition in culture and art.

work must acquire a new condition

In order for it to develop in culture, work must acquire a new condition; man as commodity ceases to exist and a system is established that grants a quota for the fulfillment of social duty. The means of production belong to society and the machine is only the front line where duty is performed. Man begins to free his thought from the bothersome fact that presupposed the need to satisfy his animal needs by working. He begins to see himself portrayed in his work and to understand its human magnitude through the created object, through the work carried out. This no longer belongs to him; rather, it signifies an emanation from himself, a contribution to the life of society in which he is reflected, the fulfillment of his social duty.

We are doing everything possible to give work this new category of social duty and to join it to the development of technology, on the one hand, which will provide the conditions for greater freedom, and to voluntary work on the other, based on the Marxist concept that man truly achieves his full human condition when he produces without being compelled by the physical necessity of selling himself as a commodity.

It is clear that work still has coercive aspects, even when it is voluntary; man has still not transformed all the coercion surrounding him into conditioned reflexes of a social nature, and in many cases, he still produces under the pressure of the environment (Fidel calls this moral compulsion). He is still to achieve complete spiritual recreation in the presence of his own work, without the direct pressure of the social environment but bound to it by new habits. That will be communism.

The change in consciousness does not come about automatically, just as it does not come about automatically in the economy. The variations are slow and not rhythmic; there are periods of acceleration, others are measured and some even involve a retreat.

We must also consider, as we have pointed out previously, that we are not before a pure transition period such as that envisioned by Marx in the "Critique of the Gotha Program", but rather a new phase not foreseen by him; the first period in the transition to communism or in the building of socialism.

Elements of capitalism are present within this process, which takes place in the midst of violent class struggle. These elements obscure the complete understanding of the essence of the process.

If to this be added the scholasticism that has held back the development of Marxist philosophy and impeded the systematic treatment of the period, whose political economy has still not been developed, we must agree that we are still in diapers. We must study all the primordial features of the period before elaborating a more far-reaching economic and political theory.

The resulting theory will necessarily give preeminence to the two pillars of socialist construction: the formation of the new human being and the development of technology. We still have a great deal to accomplish in both aspects, but the delay is less justifiable as far as the conception of technology as the

basis is concerned; here, it is not a matter of advancing blindly but rather of following for a sizeable stretch the road opened up by the most advanced countries of the world. This is why Fidel harps so insistently on the necessity of the technological and scientific formation of all of our people and especially of the vanguard.

In the field of ideas that lead to non-productive activities, it is easier to see the division between material and spiritual needs. For a long time man has been trying to free himself from alienation through culture and art. He dies daily in the eight and more hours during which he performs as a commodity to resuscitate in his spiritual creation. But this remedy itself bears the germs of the same disease: he is a solitary being who seeks communion with individuality and reacts to esthetic ideas as a unique being whose aspiration is to remain immaculate.

It is only an attempt at flight. The law of value is no longer a mere reflection of production relations; the monoply capitalists have surrounded it with a complicated scaffolding which makes of it a docile servant, even when the methods are purely empirical. The artist must be educated in the kind of art imposed by the super-structure. The rebels are overcome by the apparatus and only exceptional talents are able to create their own work. The others become shame-faced wage-workers or they are crushed.

Artistic experiementation is invented and is taken as the definition of freedom, but this "experimentation" has limits which are imperceptible until they are clashed with, that is, when the real problems of man and his alienated condition are dealt with. Senseless anguish or vulgar pasttimes are comfortable safety valves for human uneasiness; the idea of making a weapon of denunciation and accusation is combatted.

# a new impulse for artistic experimentation

When the Revolution took power, the exodus of the totally domesticated took place; the others, revolutionaries or not, saw a new road. Artistic experimentation took on new force. However, the routes were more or less traced behind the word freedom. This attitude, a reflection in the consciousness of bourgeois idealism, was frequently maintained in the revolutionaries themselves.

In countries that have gone through a similar process, endeavors were made to combat these tendencies with an exaggerated dogmatism. General culture became something like a taboo and a formally exact representation of nature was proclaimed as the height of cultural as piration. This later became a mechanical representation of social reality created by wishful thinking; the ideal society, almost without conflict or contradictions, that man was seeking to create.

Socialism is young and makes mistakes. We revolutionaries often lack the knowledge and the intellectual audacity to face the task of the development of the new human being by methods different from the conventional ones, and the conventional methods suffer from the influence of the society that created them (once again the topic of the relation between form and content appears). Disorientation is great and the problems of material construction absorbe us. There are no artists of great authority who also have great revolutionary authority.

The men of the Party must take this task upon themselves and seek the achievement of the principal aim: to educate the people.

What is then sought is simplification, what everyone understands, that is, what the functionaries understand. True artistic experimentation is obliterated and the problem of general culture is reduced to the assimilation of the socialist present and the dead (and therefore not dangerous) past. Socialist realism is thus born on the foundation of the art of the last century.

But the realistic art of the 19th century is also class art, perhaps more purely capitalist than the decadent art of the 20th century, where the anguish of alienated man shows through. In culture, capitalism has given all that it had to give and all that remains of it is the foretast of a bad-smelling corpse; in art, its present decadence. But why endeavor to seek in the frozen forms of socialist realism the only valid recipe? "Freedom" cannot be set against socialist realism because the former does not yet exist; it will not come into being until the complete development of the society. But let us not attempt to condemn all post-mid-nineteenth century art forms from the pontifical throne of realism-at-all-costs; that would mean committing the Proudhonian error of the return to the past, and strait-jacketing the artistic expression of the man who is born and being formed today.

An ideological and cultural mechanism must be developed which will permit experimentation and clear out the weeds that shoot up so easily in the fertilized soil of state subsidization.

The error of mechanical realism has not appeared (in Cuba), but rather the contrary. This is so because of the lack of understanding of the need to create a new human being who will represent neither 19th century ideas nor those of our decadent and morbid century. It is the twenty-first century man whom we must create, although this is still a subjective and unsystematic aspiration. This is precisely one of the basic points of our studies and work; to the extent that we make concrete achievements on a theoretical base or vice versa, that we come to broad theoretical conclusions on the basis of our concrete studies, we will have made a valuable contribution to Marxism-Leninism, to cause of mankind.

The reaction against 19th century man has brought a recurrence of 20th century decadence. It is not a very serious error, but we must overcome it so as not to leave the doors open to revisionism.

The large multitudes of people are developing themselves, the new ideas are acquiring an adequate impetus within society, the material possibilities of the integral development of each and every one of its members make the task ever more fruitful. The present is one of struggle; the future is ours.

To sum up, the fault of many of our intelectuals and artists is to be found in their "original sin": they are not authentically revolutionary. We can attempt to graft elm trees so that they bear pears, but at the same time we must plant pear trees. The new generations will arrive free of original sin. The likelihood that exceptional artists will arise will be then much greater because of the possibilities for expression. Our job is to keep the present generation, maladjusted by its conflicts, from becoming perverted and perverting the new generations. We do not want to create salaried workers docile to official thinking nor "fellows" who live under the wing of the budget, exercising freedom in quotation marks. Revolutionaries will come to sing the song of the new man with the authentic voice of the people. It is a process that requires time.

# THE RISE OF THE FACIST

The following is excerps "from the Preface to the Third Edition, Mass Psychology of Facism, written in Nazi Germany in 1933, by Wilheim Reich. Because of the suppression of all of Reich's works and because of the pretinance of his description of the rise of the fascist state, this valuable preface has been reprinted, fuck copyrights."

The MASSENPSYCHOLOGIE DES FASCHISMUS took shape during the years of the German crisis of 1930 to 1933. It was written in 1933. The first edition appeared in September 1933 and the second in April 1934 in Denmark.

Sex-economic sociology was born out of the attempts to harmonize the depth psychology of Freud with the economic theory of Marx. Human existence is determined by instinctual and socio-economic processes. But we must refute any eclectic attempts at an arbitrary combination of "instinct" and "economy." Sex-economic sociology dissolves the fateful contradiction which made psychoanalysis forget the social factor and made Marxism forget the animal origin of man. As I once put it, psychoanalysis is the father and sociology the mother of sex-economy. But a child is more than the sum of its parents. It is a new, independent being with a future of its own.

#### CENSORSHIP OF WORK

Really one would have expected that parties which pretended to be fighting for human freedom would have welcomed my political-psychological work. As the archives of our Institute prove abundantly, the exact opposite was the case. The greater the social effects of the mass-psychological work, the more violent were the counter-measures of the party politicans. As early as 1932, the Socialist as well as the Communist organizations, over the vigorous protest of their own members, prohibited the distribution of the works published by the Verlag for Sexualpolitik, then in Berlin. I was threatened with execution as soon as Marxism should gain power in Germany. In 1932, against the explicit wish of their members, the Communist organizations in Germany banned sex-economic physicians from their meetings, as the Social Democrats in Austria had done as early as 1929 and 1930, I was expelled from both organizations because I introduced sexology into sociology and pointed out its implications for human structure formation. Between 1934 and 1937, it was again and again the officials of the Communist parties who reminded the fascist circles in Europe of the "dangerousness" of sex-economy. The sex-economic publications were turned back at the Soviet Russian border as were the masses of fugitives who tried to escape German fascism. These are facts which cannot be countered by any argument.

### Misinterpreted Marxism

Today it has become absolutely clear that fascism is not the deed of a Hitler or Mussolini, but the expression of the irrational structure of the mass individual. Today it is clearer than ten years ago that the race theory is biological mysticism. Today, one is closer to an understanding of the orgastic longing as a mass phenomenon than ten years ago; there is more of a general inkling of the fact that fascist mysticism is orgastic longing under the conditions of mystification and inhibition of natural sexuality. The sex-economic statements in the book showed themselves to be as true as ten years ago, and to be further confirmed by the experiences of the past ten years. The Marxist party slogans in the book, on the other hand, were all shown to be erroneous; they all had to be replaced.

The change in terminolgy takes into account an important fact: today it is no longer the Communist and Socialist parties but, in opposition to them, many unpolitical people and groups of people of all shades of political opinion who are developing more and more a revolutionary attitude, who, in other words, are striving for a basically new, rational social order. There is a rather

general awareness of the fact that the world, in its fight against the fascist pestilence, has entered a phase of a gigantic international revolution. The concept "proletarian" was coined more than a hundred years ago to connote a stratum of society which was deprived of all rights. True, there are still such groups. but the great-grandchildren of the proletarians of the 19th century have developed into specialized, technically trained industrial workers who are socially responsible and conscious of their skills. The term "class consciousness" has to be replaced by "work consciousness" or "social responsibility."

Marxist sociology, out of its ignorance of mass psychology, contrasted the "bourgeois" with the "proletarian." This is erroneous. A certain character structure is not limited to the capitalist, but pervades the working people in all professions. There are revolutionary capitalists and reactionary workers. There are no characterological class distinctions in the biophysical depth of human structure. The fascist pestilence makes it clear that the economistic concepts of "bourgeoisie" and "proletariat" have to be replaced by the characterological concepts of "reactionary" and "revolutionary."

The vulgar-Marxist concept of "private enterprise" was irrationally misinterpreted to mean that the revolutionary development of society would bring about the abolition of all private property. Of course, the political reaction made capital of this misinterpretation. As a matter of fact, the development of social and individual freedom has nothing to do with the so-called "abolition of private property." The Marxist concept of private property did not pertain to people's hirts, pants, typewriters, toilet paper, books, beds, savings, residences or plots of land. It referred, exclusively, to the private possession of the social means of production which determine the social process, such as railroads, power plants, mines, etc. The "socialization of the means of production" became a bogey because it was confused with the "expropriation of private proterty" such as chickens, shirts, books, residences, etc. During the past hundred years, socialization of the means of production has reduced their private ownership in all capitalistic countries, in varying degrees.

Because the structure and the incapacity for freedom of the working people made them unable to adapt to-the tremendous development of the social organizations, it came to pass that the "state" exercised functions which properly would have been those of the "society" of the working people. In Soviet Russia, the alleged acropolis of Marxism, there is no trace of a "socialization of the means of production." The Marxist parties had failed to distinguish "socialization." The

present war has shown that the American government, e.g., has the right and the means to nationalize poorly functioning industrial plants. A soicialization of the means of production, their transfer from the private ownership of individuals to society is a much less frightening concept if one begins to realize that today, as a result of the war, there are in the capitalist countries only few independent private owners left while there are a great many collective owners responsible to the government; and if one further realizes that in Soviet Russia the state factories are in no way at the disposal of the workers, but of groups of government officials. The socialization of the means of production will not be possible until the masses of the working people become structurally capable of administering it, that is, not until they are conscious of their responsibility.

This is the main sociological reason why the private economy of the 19th century changes everywhere to an increasing degree into a state-capitalistic economy. In the strictly Marxist sense, there is not even in Soviet Russia a state socialism but a state capitalism. According to Marx, the social condition "capitalism" does not consist in the existence of individual capitalists, but in the existence of the specific "capitalist mode of production," that is, in the production of exchange values instead of use values, in wage work of the masses and in the production of surplus value, which is appropriated by the state or the private owners, and not by the society of the working people. In this strictly Marxist sense, the capitalistic system continues to exist in Russia. And it will continue to exist as long as the masses of people continue to lack responsibility to crave authority.

Sex-economic structural psychology adds the characterological and biological to the purely economic comprehension of society. The elimination of individual capitalists and the replacement of private capitalism by state capitalism in Russia has not in the least altered the typical helpless and authoritarian character structure of the masses of people.

Furthermore, the political ideology of the European Marxist parties operated with purely economic conditions characteristic of a span of about two hundred years of mechanical development from the end of the 17th to the 19th century. Fascism of the 20th century, on the other hand, threw into focus the basic questions of the human character, of mysticism and the craving for authority, problems pertaining to a span of 4-6000 years.

From all this it is obvious that the fascist mass pestilence, with its background of thousands of years, cannot be mastered with social measures corresponding to the past three hundred years.

### Freudian Contribution

Extensive and conscientious therapeutic work on the human character has taught me that, in judging human reactions, we have to take into account three different layers of the biopsychic structure. As I have shown in my book, CHARACTER-ANALYSIS, these layers are autonomously functioning representations of social development. In the superficial layer, the average individual is restrained, polite, compassionate and conscientious. There would be no social tragedy of the animal, man, if this superficial layer were in immediate contact with his deep natural core. His tragedy is that such is not the

case. The superficial layer of social cooperation is not in contact with the biological core of the person, but separated from it by a second, intermediary character layer consisting of cruel ssdistc, lascivio us, predatory and envious impulses. This is the Freudian "unconscious" "repressed"; in sex-economic language, it is the sum total of the "secondary impulses." Orgone biophysics has shown that the Freudian unconscious the antisocial element in the human structure, is a secondary result of the repression of primary bilogical impulses. If one penetrates through this second, perverse and antisocial layer, one arrives regularly at a third, the deepest layer, which we call the biological core. In this deepest layer, man, under favorable social conditions, is an honest, industrious, cooperative animal capable of love and also of rational hatred. In character-analytic work, one cannot penetrate to this deep, promising layer without first eliminating the false, sham-social surface. What makes its appearance when this cultivated mask falls away, however, is not natural sociality, but the perverse antisocial layer

As a result of this unfortunate structure, every natural social or libidinous impulse from the biological core must, on its way to action, pass the layer of the perverse secondary impulses where it becomes deflected. This deflection changes the originally social character of the natural impulse into a perverse impulse and thus inhibits any natural life manifestation.

of the character.

#### The

### **Biological Nucleus**

We can now apply our insights into human structure to the social and political field. It is not difficult to see that the diverse political and ideological groups in human society correspond to the various layers of human character structure. We do, of course, not follow idealistic philosophy in its belief that this human structure is eternal and unalterable. After social conditions and changes have formed the original biological needs into the character structure, the latter, in the form of ideologies, reproduces the social structure.

Since the decline of the primitive work-democratic organization, the biological core of man has remained without social representation. That which is "natural" in man, which makes him one with the cosmos, has found its genuine expression only in the arts, particularly in music and painting. Until now, however, it has remained without any essential influence upon the form of human society, if by society is meant not the culture of a small rich upper crust but the community of all people.

In the ethical and social ideals of liberalism we recognize the representation of the superficial layer of the character, of self-control and tolerance. The ethics of this liberalism serve to keep down "the beast" in man, the second layer, our "secondary impulses," the Freudian "unconscious." The natural sociality of the deepest, nuclear layer is alien to the liberal. He deplores the perversion of human character and fights it with ethical norms, but the social catastrophes of this century show the inadequacy of this approach.

All that which is genuinely revolutionary, all genuine art and science stems from the natural biological nucleus. Neither the genuine revolutionary nor the (Continued on page 11) (Continued from page 10) artist or scientist has been able thus far to win over and lead masses or, if so, to keep them in the realm of the life interests.

In contradistinction to liberalism, which represents the superficial character layer, and to genuine revolution, which represents the deepest layer, fascism represents essentially the second character layer, that of the secondary impulses.

At the time when this book was orginally written, fascism was generally regarded a "political party" which, like any other "social group," was an organized representation of a "political idea." According to this concept, the fascist party "introduced" fascism by force or by "political manoeuvre."

Contrary to this concept, my medical experience with individuals from all kinds of social strata, races, nationalities and religions showed me that "fascism" is only the politically organized expression of the average human character structure, a character structure which has nothing to do with this or that race, nation or party but which is general and international. In this characterological sense, "fascism" is the basic emotional attitude of man in authoritarian society, with its machine civilization and its mechanistic-mystical view of life.

It is the mechanistic-mystical character of man in our times which creates fascist parties, and not vice versa.

#### **Fallacious Reasoning**

Even today, as a result of fallacious political thinking, fascism is still being considered a specific national characteristic of the Germans or the Japanese. The stubborn persistence of this fallacy is due to the fear of recognizing the truth: fascism is an international phenomenon which permeates all organizations of human society in all nations. This conclusion is confirmed by the international events of the past 1,5 years.

From the first fallacy all other misinterpretations follow logically. To the detriment of genuine endeavors for freedom, fascism is still regarded as the dictatorship of a small reactionary clique. My character-analytic experience, however, shows that there is today not a single individual who does not have the elements of fascist feeling and thinking in his structure. Fascism as a political movement differs, from other reactionary parties in that it is supported and championed by masses of people. I am fully conscious of the responsibility involved in such statements. I could only wish, in the interest of this battered world, that the working masses had an equal realization of their responsibility for fascism.

One has to distinguish ordinary militarism from fascism. Germany under the Kaiser was militaristic, but not fascist.

Since fascism, always and everywhere, appears as a movement which is supported by the masses of people, it also displays all the traits and contradictions present in the average character structure: Fascism is not, as is generally believed, a purely reactionary movement; rather, it is a mixture of rebellious emotions and reactionary social ideas.

If, by being revolutionary, one means rational rebellion aganist intolerable social conditions, if, by being radical, one means "going to the root of things," the rational will to improve them, then fascism is never revolutionary. True, it may have the aspect of revolutionary emotions. But one would not call that physician revolutionary who proceeds against a disease with violent cursing but the other who quietly, courageously and conscientiously studies and fights the causes of the disease. Fascist rebelliousness always occurs where fear of the truth turns a revolutionary emotion into illusions.

#### Racism

In its pure form, fascism is the sum total of all irrational reactions of the average human character. To the narrow-minded sociologist who lacks the courage to recognize the enormous role played by the irrational in human history, the fascist race theory appears as nothing but an imperialistic interest or even a mere "prejudice." The violence and the ubiquity of these "race prejudices" show their origin from the irrational part of the human character. The race theory is not creation of fascism. No: fascism is a creation of race hatred and its politically organized expression. Correspondingly, there is a German, Italian, Spanish, Anglo-Saxon, Jewish and Arabian fascism. The race ideology is a true biopathic character symptom of the orgastically impotent individual.

The sadistic perverse character of the race ideology is also seen in the attitude toward religion. Fascism, we are told, is the arch-enemy of religion, and a regression to paganism. On the contrary, fascism is the extreme expression of religious mysticism. As such it appears in a specific social form. Fascism is based on that religiosity which stems from sexual perversion; it changes the masochistic character of the old patriarchal religions into a sadistic religion. It takes religion out of the other-world philosophy of suffering and places it in the sadistic

murder in this world.

### **Fascist Mentality**

Fascist mentality is the mentality of the subjugated "little man" who craves authority and rebels against it at the same time. It is not by accident that all fascist dictators stem from the milieu of the little reactionary man. The captains of industry and the feudal militarist make use of this social fact for their own purposes. A mechanistic authoritarian civilization only reaps, in the form of fascism, from the little, suppressed man what for hundreds of years it has sown in the masses of little, suppressed individuals in the form of mysticism, top-sergeant mentality and automatism. This little man has only too well learned the way of the big man and now gives it back, enlarged and distorted. The Fascist is the top-sergeant type in the vast army of our sick civilization. One cannot with impunity beat the tom-tom of high politics before the little man. The little top-sergeant has outdone the imperialistic general in everything: in martial music, in goose-stepping, in giving orders and obeying them, in the deadly fear of thinking, in diplomacy, strategy and tactics, in uniformed strutting and in medals. In all these things a Kaiser Wilhelm appears as a poor bungler compared with Hitler. When a "proletarian" general covers his chest with medals, on both sides, and from the shoulders to the belt, he demonstrates the little man trying to outdo the "real" great general.

One must have thoroughly studied the character of the suppressed little man and must have learned to see things as they take place behind the facade, if one is to understand the forces on which fascism is based.

In the rebellion of the masses of abused people against the empty niceties of a false liberalism (I do not mean genuine liberalism and genuine tolerance) the character layer of the secondary impulses was expressed.

One cannot make the Fascist harmless if, according to the politics of the day, one looks for him only in the German or Italian, or the American or the Chinese; if one does not look for him in oneself; if one does not know the social institutions which hatch him every day. One can beat fascism only if one meets it objectively and practically, with a well-grounded knowledge of the life processes. One cannot equal it in politics, in diplomacy or strutting. But it has no answer to practical questions of living, for it sees everything only in the mirror of ideology or in the form of the state uniform. When

one hears a fascist character of whatever hue preach about the "honor of the nation" (instead of the honor of man) or about the "salvation of the sacred family and the race" (instead of the society of working individuals), if he lets out a stream of empty slogans, one only has to ask him this:

"What are you doing to feed the nation, without plundering or killing other nations? What do you, as a physician, do against the chronic diseases, or as an educator for the happiness of children, or as an economist for the elimination of poverty, or as a social worker for the mothers of too many children, or as a builder for more hygienic living conditions? Give us a concrete, practical answer or shut up!"

### Vanquishing Fascism

Clearly, international fascism will never be vanquished by political manoeuvres. It can only be vanquished by the natural organization of work, love and knowledge on an international scale.

As yet, work, love and knowledge have not the power to determine human existence. More than that, these great forces of the positive life principle are not even conscious of their strength, their indispensability and their decisive role in the determination of human existence. For this reason, human society, even after the military defeat of party fascism, continues to hover at the brink of the abyss. The downfall of our civilization is inevitable if those who work, and the natural scientists in all branches of life (not death), and those who give and receive natural love, do not become conscious, in time, of their gigantic responsibility.

Will human and social freedom, will self-regulation of our lives and that of our children come about peacefully or by force? Nobody can tell. But those who know the living function in the animal, in the newborn or in the true worker, be he a mechanic, a researcher or an artist, cease to think in those terms created by party systems. The living function cannot "seize power by force," for it would not know what to do with power. Does that mean that life will forever be at the mercy of politcal gangsterdom, that the politicians will forever suck its blood? No, it would be wrong to draw this conclusion.

As a physician, I have to treat diseases, as a researcher I have to disclose unknown facts in nature. If, now, a political wind-bag were to try to force me to leave my patients and my microscope, I would not let myself be disturbed but would, if necessary, throw him out. Whether or not I have to use force in order to protect my work on the living function against intruders does not depend on me or my work but on the intruders' degree of impertinence. Let us assume that all those who do work on the living function were able to recognize the political wind-bag in time. They would act in the same way. Perhaps this over-simplified example gives a partial answer to the question as to how the living functions, sooner or later, will defend itself against its intruders and destroyers.

# Call Me Irresponsible

Since I have been charged with irresponsibility (aligning myself with the actions of the Berated (sic) Press I feel that I must try to see of what it is I am guilty.

Part of being human is responding to society. This is inescapable. Men are able to respond because society provides them with means of self-fulfillment. These means are traditions, customs, mores, habits, organizations, functions, communities, and so on. When the means of individual and social growth no longer function as such, i.e. when men can no longer respond meaningfully to them, then the individuals within that society become unable to respond. They become irresponsible.

spensible.

Conversely, society itself (i.e. the managers and overseers thereof) is irresponsible when it is unable to respond to the needs and desires of those who make up that society. Then it is the duty of its members to reconstruct, either wholly or in part, that society which has become irresponsible, sterile, stagnant and out-

Being desiring, needing organisms, however, men find that they are able to change their environment so they may once again respond positively to it. By attempting to change their society, they

are acting as responsible human beings.
In setting these melodies to the rhythm of the university, the song rings out fairly clearly.

To whom and for whom is the university responsible? Presuming this pile of buildings to be FOR something and for someONE, we may advance the subtle thesis that the university exists for the growth and development of its inhabitants, and is therefore responsible to THEM. It owes no allegiance to the community, alumni, contributors, favorite

sons, favorite companies, brokers, outside interests, or alien concerns of any sort. If the university, (administrators, staff, faculty, and students), cannot supply postive conditions of mutual and self-growth, then it is irresponsible.


What of the students? and their responsibility? They respond to each other, to the faculty, and to the administration, and are able to respond PROVIDED THE CONDITIONS SERVE THEM MEANING-FULLY. Meaningfullness for a student, however, indicates that there are conditions for inquiry and experimentation, suspension of judgment, and laboratories of idea-testing through which they may learn to educate themselves sometime BEFORE their four-year sentence is up.

Should some function or organ of the university NOT be a positive condition wherein he may fulfill his desire to learn and his need to grow, THEN THE STUDENT IS INDEED IRRESPONSIBLE, for he cannot then respond to himself through his environment. In this sense I am guilty of irresponsibility as charged.

So we may ask, now, some questions? Does the University of Hartford allow us to inquire, search, test, experiment and challenge regarding the responsibility of our environment? Does it allow us in EVERY ASPECT AND ON EVERY LEVEL to test and challenge the meaningfulness and relevance of our total environment, its traditions, customs, mores, habits, organizations, functions, communities, and so on? Does it allow us open dialogue in our testing and inquiring? Is there ANYTHING it will not allow us to speak about or look at? Does the University of Hartford hold its outside interests to be more sacred than its inside interests?

The events of last week seem to suggest that something is rotten in the UofH. I would also suggest that the University of Hartford has demonstrated gross irresponsibility toward its students, because of which the students themselves must become irresponsible and remain so, until the environment is changed. An

irresponsible student burts only himself, An irresponsible university cripples ALL of its members. Hepocully the university will realize WHY its students are irresponsible, and will grow in the process.












### Hawks Down Pratt, Yeshiva Over Weekend



# Wrestling Captain Injured



### Hartford Stage Does New Play

London Bridge is falling down, Salvator Waltz is coming round and a strange thing we have found, it was all a D-R-E-A-M-M! "The Waltz Invention" is like a mist which spreads over a three hour period and puts the audience to sleep. Well, perhaps at a Sunday matinee after a large dinner one tends not to care about Mr. Waltz and his dreamed invention.

Never the less, Waltz had a dream and Nobolson wrote a play. If one were wise, he would leave the stuff of dreams alone. In a dream state there is little firm ground, many questions, and only weak answers.

Mr. Waltz is an inventor with an awesome "weapon." He comes to the Minister of War and asks that his "weapon" be recognized. He is rejected and at that point the fun begins. The most peculiar people pop up. When they are not being peculiar people they are funny Generals, with funny names ending in "ump" such as: Dump, Stump, Rump, Lump, Plump, Mump, Hump, Gump, and Bump. When neither of those, they are affected by Trance - and such a beautiful Trance to be affected by!

There is an absurd committee meeting which includes three dummy-"umps." They are all doing their thing at the meeting. Some have toy cars or blocks, one has a lunch to munch, one a bell to ring, one does needlepoint and one sails paper airplanes into the audience. Then in a tirade of words approaching an Ionesco play, Trance gives the report in a complete babble in which nothing is intelligible. It is by far the funniest scene in the play.

Rowland Hewgill did as well with the role of Waltz as could be expected, although he had little to work with. David O. Petersen had similar problems with the role of Plump. The author failed to create characters which could be effectively done even by fine performers, as these were.

Henry Thomas gives a marvellously funny performance as the Minister of War. The humor he invests the role with and the bits of business that are uniquely Thomas, make the role come to life.

Ed Preble is a funny General Gump. He gives this otherwise dull character a chance for audience understanding. He manages to get most of the nuances which this role contains.

Viola Trance is done with assurance by Charlotte Moore. Miss Moore went for an interpretation of this role that she felt was valid. It worked and worked well. One wonders what Mr. Nobolson hoped for in this asexual fantasy figure, if indeed he hoped for anything.

Mr. Nobolson's play is of dubious worth as it stands. It's primary failings are its length and ambiguity. The ambiguity is necessarily the effect of a dream play. However, even in the illogicality of dreams there can be found scenes of crystal clarity. The play is interminably long and you are painfully aware of that fact - it needs tightening.

Salvator Waltz had a dream born of his sexual frustrations about getting mommy. His dream is cloaked in the mask of ascendancy to power. The military motif manages to further insulate the underlying meaning. His "Machine" is a London Bridge which is falling down and he'll never get Daddy out of the spot he would like to hold. His ultimate reality is madness. The question I'm left with is should one tamper with a dream?

### An Era Without Restraint

An era is finished -- an era of horrifying tragedies, unrealized aspirations, and shattered hopes of an idealistic utopia of the America the Beautiful! vintage with brotherhood from sea to shining sea. It transcended all boundaries of the imagination, engulfing a dichotomy of man's noblest struggles to a nation's capacity to self-destruct itself within a matter of moments. It was also an 'Up With People' era with a chorus of 'God-damn Nigger' between numbers; the American in Vietnam reading: "Caution: Cigarette Smoking May Be Hazardous to Your Health," and the New York Times with all the news that's fit to print of government slaughtering grounds, massive world starvation, urban rioting and American paid-for Vietnamese corruption. It was the period of the Civil Rights Bill, the twenty-fourth Amendment, and the Nobel prize winner for peace, The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., as well as an era of DaNang, Chicago, and Prague.

It was an era that took root with John Kennedy, but withered and died under Lyndon Johnson. It died not from apathy, or an inability of the government to attempt solutions for the problems of the times, but from an apathetic public and the inability of the government to supply sufficient trust to a public suddenly aware of the United States involvement in Vietnam. In November of 1963 it was the best of times the worst of times -- assassination became a form of political expediency amidst a time of youthful aspirations and growth. In December of that year, the new President spoke of John Kennedy's desire for "the people to have from the government which serves them a standard of excellence which would inspire their confidence," and he pledged to fulfill that goal of his predecessor. Today there is no longer confidence, but a credibility gap -- a gap widening from Vietnam, the Pueblo incidence and the Warren Commission which has led to innumerable books and speculations onits authenticity.

In an almost poetic phrase on November 27th, 1963 before a Joint session of Congress, President Johnson philosophized: "In this age when there can be no losers in peace and no victors in war, we must recognize the obligation to match national strength with national restraint." Today we must ask ourselves the question concerning the obvious death of 'national restraint.' Did it die at the hands of the government which we elected, or did it die at the hands of an apathetic public. Upon whose shoulders should the necessity of restraint fall. Regretably, a new President is a novelty in the beginning, he is viewed passionately or alarmingly depending on whether or not an individual voted for him, and then in a matter of speaking he becomes the forgotten American. We judge our Presidents by what they say in the first few days of their administration as being a condensed version of their four years in office, and being the Gospel

truth at that, only to wake up months later realizing the horrifying nightmare that we are engaged in a war of total destruction. And then it is only through the tireless efforts of a few, and the imprisonment of many that the truth becomes evident to all.

Silence is a vote in the affirmative, if an individual does not receive condemnation of his policy, he will continue that policy believing it to be sanctioned by all. It is not difficult therefore for a President to find himself believing that he is representing the will of the people when in all honesty he is fulfilling only his own political desires.

In viewing the last six years of the Johnson administration, it is difficult to say whether a public apathy led the President to follow his plans in South East Asia or whether the public was not given all the necessary information to formulate an opinion one way or the other. However, over the years there have been reports published by individuals attacking the Vietnamese policy so it would appear that in this incidence the public is as much in fault of our continuing commitment in Vietnam as the government. It was only after the McCarthy and Kennedy primary battles that a major condemnation of Vietnam was shown as the expression of the public. And for this reason the President resigned on March 31st of 1968.

I cannot totally support President Johnson, nor can I completely condemn his actions. Who is the guardian of 'national restraint,' is it the government or is it the public: That is the question which we must address ourselves to with our new administration. Will we follow it faithfully the first few months and then let it sink into oblivion so that another Vietnam can be conceived of, or will we use every means now available to us through protests and our organization to make sure that our government knows and understands our desires. That is a question which only time will show.

### Zoology Class SIGN OF To Hold Lab In Bermuda

A specialized course in marine invertebrate zoology, offered in Bermuda last spring, has been expanded as a regular part of the graduate curriculum at the Uni-

versity of Hartford.
Under the title "Field Study in Marine Invertebrate Zooogy," the course will meet at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday evenings, beginning Feb. 6, in Dana Hall, UofH science and engineering center.

Three graduate credits may be earned, according to Dr. Elisabeth R. Swain, UofH biology chairman. Lectures and laboratory work, at the university and in Bermuda. will be supervised by Dr. Tracy L. Simpson, assistant professor of biology. Prof. Simpson is a specialist in the demospongiae, or

The course is open to qualified undergraduates, graduate dents, and school teachers.

Lectures will center on functional morphology and physiology of sponges, caidaria, echinoderms, annelids, ectoprocts, mollusks and tunicates.

Laboratory work in Bermuda will take place at the Bermuda Biological Station, St. George's West, where students will also live. Studies will be made on living corals; gorgonia -- sea fans and sea whips, and sponges, anemones and jellyfish.

Work in Bermuda will include the collection and identification of shallow-water fauna, and a one-day oceanographic excursion for the collection of plankton and a demonstration of water-sampling tech-

The Bermuda workshop will be conducted during two periods -- farch 28-April 6, and April 17-26. ents may choose either period.

### Hartt Singers & Symphony Invited to D.C.

The Hartt Symphony, Hartt Chamber Singers and Hartt Madrigal Singers of Hartt College of Music, University of Hartford, have been invited to perform at the eastern division convention of the Music Educators National Conference in Washington, D. C. at the end of January.

The Symphony will be conducted by Dr. Nathan Gottschalk, executive director of Hartt College, and the two choral groups by Dr. Gerald Mack, director of choral activities.

The first concert will be given by the Singers, on Thursday, January 30 at 8 p.m. at the Washington Hilton, convention headquarters. Works by Brahms, Bach, Poulenc, Monteverdi, Marenzio and Britten will be among those performed by the 45-member Hartt Chamber Singers and the 15-member Madrigals.

The Symphony will be heard on Sunday, Feb. 2 at 3:30 p.m., also at the Washington Hilton, in a performance of works by Hindemith, von Weber and Berlioz.

Both ensembles will perform compositions written by Hartt faculty members. The Chamber Singers will present "Fancy from 'Four Elizabethan Songs'" by Alvin Epstein, and the Orchestra will play Edward Miller's "Sinfonietta for String Orchestra," Epstein and Miller are award-winning composers. Both have been Fulbright scholars, and Miller spent last year in Rome as a Guggenheim fellow.

Cover design for the concert programs was created by Donald Kingston, a student at the University's Art School.

Several members of the Hartt College faculty and student body will attend the convention, and a reception Saturday evening, Feb. 1, will be hosted by Dr. Moshe Paranov, Hartt president and University vice-chancellor for performing arts.

### Police Eligible For US Loans In UofH Program

Full-time police officers, as well as undergraduate, graduate and evening students interested in law enforcement courses, are urged to take advantage of a \$24,100 federal allocation made to the University of Hartford.

The allocation has been made under Title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 by the Office of Academic Assistance, Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, U. S. Department of Justice.

Beginning with the Spring Semester, students taking either a police science degree program or police-related courses are eligible to receive loans of up to \$1,800 a year or federal grants of up to \$300 a semester.


The \$1,800 loans are intended for full-time undergraduate or graduate students, provided recipients agree to spend at least two years in the field of law enforcement after completion of their police programs. The loans are forgivable at the rate of 25 per cent per year spent in law enforcement after graduation.

Part-time students who are fulltime employees of law enforcement agencies may apply for \$300 semester grants. Major proviso is the submission of a statement from the police chief concerned that the courses which the student selects are useful in police work.

The Bachelor of Science degree program in Public Administration, with concentration in police science, offers 122 credit hours in the liberal arts, science, police

science, business and public administration. Almost all these courses may be taken this spring.

The area of police concentration itself carries 21 credit hours. Two police science courses, of three credits each, are being given during the Spring Term.

"Principles of Investigation" will meet at 6:30 p.m. Monday evenings. Instructor will be Edward F. Stanford, of the UofH adjunct faculty. Stanford is a member of the U.S. Treasury Department staff in Hartford.

"Statutory Criminal Law in Connecticut," a 6:30 p.m. Thursday course, will be taught by Martin A. Clayman, Hartford attorney and adjunct faculty member.

As Acting Director of Alumni Relations, Hunter will work closely with the university's 10,000 alumni, His duties will include alumni cultural and social events. Administratively, he will coordinate the activities of the UofH Alumni Federation and its associated or-

ganizations. He will also assist in special projects which involve the university's alumni, its development program, and the Alumni Fund.

As an undergraduate English Literature major, Hunter first came to the notice of UofH officials as chairman of the 11th annual Leadership Conference, held in October, 1966 at Grossinger's, Liberty, N.Y. Keynote speaker was Robert Theobald, well-known British social economist.

### **New Ed Courses**

Three new graduate education courses will be offered for the Spring Semester by the School of Education, University of Hartford.

Dr. Barbara W. Eustace will conduct a "Workshop in Individualized Instruction" at 6:30 p.m. Thursday. Prof. Eustace, who joined the UofH faculty in 1967, holds a Doctor of Philosophy degree from Washington University in instructional process and curriculum.

Prof. Eustace's workshop will cover the techniques used in individualized learning programs in a variety of subject areas. Teachers will develop learning packages for classroom use. These materials are intended for fast, moderate and slow learners.

Dr. Milton A. Young, associate professor at the UofH Institute for Human Development, will teach a course under the title "Special Study: Techniques of Educational Change," at 6:30 p.m. Monday. The course is intended for supervisory and administrative personnel, including principals.

Dr. Young's class is based on the need for change in educational staff procedures. Participants in the class will learn such techniques by suggesting changes, with group members and UofH staff people acting as consultants.

Prof. Ann Marie Bernazza joined the UofH faculty last fall. She is an experimental methodologist in education. Prof. Bernazza will conduct a 4:15 p.m. Thursday class in "Psychology of Educational Management."

The course centers on the application of scientific research in educational management and supervision. The course will cover analyses of learning styles; communication linking administrator, teacher and classroom; educational program development, and methods for effecting needed change.

### New Graduate Courses At Uof H

Advance registration for four newly introduced graduate programs in English, sociology, and the teaching of biology and English, is now under way for the Spring Semester at the University of Hartford.

The Master of Arts degree program in English is being advised by Dr. Lee W. Yosha, English Department chairman.

The Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.) degree program in English is being advised by Dr. Arthur W. Kairott, chairman, Department of Secondary Education.

For both English programs, five liberal arts graduate courses are listed, two not previously offered. "Studies in the Form of the Drama" will be taught at 4:15 p.m. Tuesday by Dr. Alan Brody, assistant professor of English. Prof. Brody is a critic and essayist.

"Studies in the Novel" will be conducted at 4:15 p.m. Monday by Dr. Leonard J. Kent, chairman of the English Department at Quinnipiac College. Dr. Kent is a member of the UofH adjunct faculty.

"Studies in American Literary Problems" will be given at 4:15 p.m. Wednesday by Gorham Munson, distinguished visiting professor of English. Prof. Munson has enjoyed a notable career as an editor, author and teacher.

"Seminar in Milton" will be conducted at 4:15 p.m. Thursday by Dr. Harold Levitt, a UofH adjunct faculty member. Dr. Levitt teaches English at Brooklyn College.

"Studies in Language and Linguistics" will be taught at 4:15 p.m. Thursday by Herbert Pagani, also an adjunct faculty teacher. Pagani is chairman of the English Department at Alfred Plant Junior High School, West Hartford.

Advisors for the sociology program are Dr. Rollin Chambliss, department chairman, and Dr. Leon F. Fannin, professor of sociology.

For the Master of Arts degree program in sociology, two new courses are being offered. Prof. Fannin will teach "Methods of Social Research" at 6:30 p.m. Monday. A Wednesday evening course at 6:30 p.m. -- "Urban Community Organization" -- will be given by Dr. Norman Ofslager, associate professor of sociology.


