

A "Risk for Peace"

"--those who foolishly sought power by riding on the back of the tiger ended up inside." - JFK Jan. 20, 1961

What Humphrey needs is balls! For the past four years, Hubert H. Humphrey has been castrated by the LBJ machine. For a politician with a fairly good voting record, his creative impulse has all but disappeared, his fertility has been checked. Now LBJ is castrating the HIHH campaign effort. Every statement from the mouth of Humphrey seems to be edited by the president; every idea coming from the mind of Humphrey seems to be a rehashed idea of the president. Everyone is praising Humphrey for his Salt Lake City address of Sept. 30. Hubert is calling for a bombing halt in the North (if there is reason to believe that the North is willing to show an equivilant peaceful act). He calls this a"risk for peace". This is just a rephrasing of the same stand by LBJ. What the Newspapers and Advertising managers failed to quote (from the same speech) is "President Johnson will continue--until Jan 20, 1969--to make the decisions in Vietnam. The voice at the negotiating table must be his. I shall not compete with that voice. I shall cooperate and help.'

Hubert Humphrey will not stand a chance of winning the election unless he can give the rebellious youth something to rebel with instead of against; unless he can unite the peaceloving McCarthyites with the remainder of the democratic party (which isn't very large). What we are discussing is liberation. To give the American people something to believe in, something worth going to the polls for, an alternative to the Nixon and Wallace "law and order" block, a real candidate. Hubert H. Humphrey must liberate himself. There is only one way to achieve this liberation: HUMPHREY MUST RESIGN AS VICE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. If anything happened to our beloved president between now and Jan. 20, I am sure John W. McCormack could handle a short stay in the White House. If Humphrey would take a REAL "risk for peace", we might lose a puppet of LBJ but we might gain a REAL president for the next four years.



Some feel that it has come now, but that's impossible when 68% of the nation feel that Mayor Daley did a good job in putting down the Chicago protesters. Even if the break did come now (the election of George Wallace), where would we go, what would be our action? With the S.D.S. as disorganized as it is now, the different chapters pursuing different ends, the chapters in effect personality cults, i.e. Mark Rudd and Tom Hayden; under what banner would we unite? Is it not time for a new organization to come to the fore, one dedicated to the change of established biases and reactionary principles held by our government, not afraid to take a stand on issues rather than undercutting other groups. An organization determined to be martyred because of stands it took on issues not because it refused to take stands.

Our own chapter of the S.D.S. faces the same problems as the national organization but on a larger scale as it has no personality to revolve around or basic precepts on which to operate. The Memorial Day crosses of last year were so reminiscent of the University of Wisconsin that it was almost plagiarism. We made no move to protest the Russian invasion of Czechoslovakia or to show our indignation of the treatment of the demonstrators at Chicago, or the martyrdom of Huey Newton. Today in Mexico City there is a violent fight being waged against the fascist government by the students, and we sit on our asses doing nothing. These problems must be faced.

I sincerely hope that it's not time for the shelving of the S.D.S., but by the same token it must make itself relevant to present situations, inside and outside its organization as a means of spreading the revolution it helped to begin.

In Consideration of Criticism

Pause to take stock of our duty as students of the University of Hartford. You will find that we are negligent.

We are lost. We have gone astray. We are too critical without promoting our talents and ideas toward university unity and university function. Criticism without participation is no criticism.

Innovation is let to die here. Interest is let to wane here. Radicalism on the UH campus should not disgust the student. If it has, it has been misplaced and misunderstood. The meaning of radicalism is "finding the root". We do not understand the purpose of the movement. The object of radicalism around campus is to find the root of our own dissent and move to remedy or dispense with the causes for our dissent. dispense with the causes for our dissent.

This University is a mad house of "hangups". Unless the death knoll of cliques is sounded we will find ourselves in the silences of our own burial. We must disband as groups of insecure immature people. We must unite as mature representatives of an intellectual society.

We question the roots of social detachment. We question the roots of social tension. We question and we react. What we react against cannot be found for we are the epitome of our own reaction. We are the epitome of the sick society.

The revolution must also include the student of mathematics, engineering and other practical sciences. When we attack some of the mechanical aspects of our society, we forget their practical values; that they have become endemic organs within our system. Economical progress should not have to apoligize for its result, which is alienation.

The students of our community should get together socially, intelligently and intellectually. We must begin to learn from each other. Those students of the sciences and those of the arts should be able to unite to construct from criticism.

We must bring the systems of administration down to their proper perspective. We must deal with them as a unit, as a body of men functioning under a body of obsoleteness. It is hard to pluck the greyness out of age.

The question is not the recognition of apathy. It is not even verbal or written objection. Those tend to be subjective. To be progressively radical we must work within ourselves as well as uniting as students of the University of Hartford. We must learn to function as units of the same community whether business students, artists or students of the social sciences. No one will be annihilated—everyone will be here tomorrow in his capacity. The answer is momentum. We must stand up as intelligent representatives of our system and perform. We must either destroy and reconstruct or support the best we know how.


Guilty Of Turkeycide

Finally I am aggravated to the point at which I can no longer remain silent. Some of the comments that appeared in the last

issue were too much to let pass without comment. For instance: Who else but a business student could exercise such bravado and shortsightedness in saying that a discussion of birth control was a sign of liberation twenty years ago, but that now such a discussion is only redundant! First of all, I don't believe Mr. Grella could actually ask us to believe that open discussion of birth control methods in a school paper existed twenty years ago, in 1948. 

the honor generously bestowed upon us, filling a whole page in the Sept. 25 issue of the UH News, by its initiator - Benedict Michael Holden III, President of the Student-Faculty Association.

Snide critics have said that the Chief Executive resembles a cross between Falstaff and the Marquis de Sade. We MUST disagree. A personage of such immense and indeed escalating charisma, Brother Ben appears to us as an honest, objective, compassionate student leader, wholly dedicated to constructive works and viable sol-

In the spirit of collegiate camaraderie, we should like to comment on a few constructive observations made by Friend Holdenin his September 25 presentation.

1) The SFA Action Committee did not "set up" the radio station, funds from the North House did. Operating expenses of \$6,000 DID come from the SFA for the '67-'68 year, but were allocated by Dr. Holden's predecessor, the amiable and articulate Alfred Mark Treidel, may he rest in pizza. This was Treidel, not Holden largess.

Far from hiding its 92 foot tower under an umbrella, WWUH submitted some 5 construction status reports prior to July 15, 1968 ON AIR.

The SFA received the same reports as North House, Additional reports were made to the Chancellor as the \$18,000. USED TO BUILD THE STATION WERE AP-PROPRIATED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS, who hold the station's FEDERAL Communications Commission License, Field Marshall Holden was never refused an opportunity to evaluate these reports. In fact, his continuing interest was manifested by his casual remark that he did not care "tubes and transistors we bought." After WWUH was compelled to assume an autonomous role, a summary report on building and organization was submitted to the Chancellor (and offered to Gentle Ben) which ran to over 100 not "60") pages. Read it sometime. It's a nice high.

allocation (plus a \$25 grant from Administration stooges! the Jefferson Society) were trans-

Our attention has been called to ferred from the SFA account to be honor generously bestowed account #241-65 (WWUH). The SFA treasurer did NOT request a report on each separate item of expenditure, other than approving our budget with the SFA Finance Commission in October, 1967.

WWUH is an operating radio station. Financial legerdemain is not, however, beyond OUR scope or skill. The \$45,000 contingency budget included repayment of \$18,000 to the University for construction funds; \$6,000 payment to the SFA; \$12,000 operating funds for one year; \$4,000 for the purchase of new equipment, program materials and records for the improvement of the station, and the remainder (\$5,000) as an outright gift from WWUH to the University of Hartford Library Fund.

(If this looks like robbing Archie to pay Clark, so be it. None of the money stuck to our sweaty fingers. Our bag is still Volkswagens, not Porsches.)

The \$8,700 budget submitted to the Holden Administration (they would not honor the decision of a few weeks before of the Treidel Administration to accept it) was as nude as Yul Brynner's scalp -- down to the BARE bones. We considered ourselves lucky if the 68-69 SFA even considered this amount.

The proposed \$45,000 budget did NOT go into effect until after the SFA. in its beneficent wisdom, TABLED OUR CONSTITUTION in May, 1968, despite the fact that WWUH would be a functioning operation through the summer months.

The student-North House contretemps of Feb. '68 was indeed taped by the News Dept. of WWUH, but not for clandestine distribution. There is nothing secret about these tapes. They were available to those interested ... apparently nobody was.

THERE WERE NO NEGOTIA-TIONS ABOUT A NONEXISTENT "ADVERTISING CAMPAIGN." The idea of donations or grant solicitation erupted from the cerebral creativity of WWUH staffers. Beggers we may be, and advice we may seek -- but unlike Hubert Funds from the \$6,000 Triedel Horatio Humphrey, we are NOT

The supposedly "phoney" con-

stitution, so effectively entombed by the SFA, had been formulated in fact, the night before the SFA meeting in a multi-hour bargaining session by responsible representatives of the SFA (including President Holden, their main man) and WWUH. Had this constitution been accepted, we were quite ready (as agreed the night before) to live by it. Thus, meanwhile and apparently "ad infinitum", our status, SFA wise, remained as precarious as a Soviet satellite in Eastern Europe.

Having been discarded into limbo, WWUH was compelled to devise its own constitution, which omits any reference to the seemingly inconsistent SFA. (Like the thirteen colonies, it was our duty to sever Mother's electronic umbilical cord).

Comrade Holden quotes our Good Guy Dean of Students to the effect that "the University agrees to assume any operating deficit within the approved budget" -- the \$45,-000 budget. Prease note that the \$45,000 budget was set up after we received our autonomy on June 24. Also note that June 24th was the date of Dean Addley's comment. Whazzat?

As to the deficit, again, WWUH is currently being funded by North House for operations which run to \$1,000 a month. Our original assumption was about \$12,000 (\$11,-800 to be exact) per year. Inflation, anyone?

The administration NEVER "assigned the Public Relations staff to working full time for several weeks doing PR work for the radio station." The PR staff, ON ITS OWN ACCOUNT, has indeed given WWUH aid and comfort -- and more good luck to them! (Marxian determinism, Professor Holden? S.D.S. authoritarianism? People have to be TOLD to do what they wish to do anyway?) And so far as soliciting ADVERTISING funds, FORGET it. The PR staff, like WWUH, is in NO way involved.

We have a complement of 124 people -- 29 full members; 35 associate members; 60 trainees! The active staff is informed of Executive Committee decisions within 48 hours of meetings. The WWUH Executive Committee consists of the 7 department heads:

The General Manager; Station Manager; Program Director; Business Manager; Public Relations Manager, Personnel Manager and Chief Engineer. We proceed according to the WWUH constitution which is available for anyone's perusal at North House. And our meetings can be attended by WWUH staff at their request.

WWUH, a non-commercial radio station, DOES NOT SELL ADVER-TISING! By permission of the F.C.C. we may ACKNOWLEDGE DONATIONS or grants that pay for program expenses.

For example, being a personage endowed with private funds, Brother Ben might wish to contribute, say, some of the profits of his dealing to WWUH for the production of a sympathetic commentary on Mark Rudd, S.D.S.

At any rate, the Ward Grad was Bob Haight, our Finest Chief Engineer (a fellow who gave up many, many hours of free time to work on the construction of the University's radio station). Bob graduated in August and left WWUH in September, giving up ample leeway to find a successor. Bob, incidentally, is now working for educational t.v., Channel 24.

The junior high school student is young Martin Fuhr, Steve's brother. Marty has a broadcast endorsed F.C.C. license, (B.M. Holden has an S.D.S. license) in addition to his Electricians Apprentice ticket issued by the State of Connecticut. (He is all of 14!) Yes, we DO endeavor to interest high schoolers in WWUH, WeLIKE interested youngsters. If we can recruit some of them as U of H

president at Columbia, now in limbo (Rudd, not Columbia). Our acknowledgement would be aired as follows: "The following program, compounded of transistorized crocodile tears, has been made possible through the most generous grant from Mr. Benedict Michael Holden III." Period. We could not go on to tag our fearless leader as "a senior history major, bon vivant and Beau Brummell at the University of Hartford." It is in this way that WWUH has been able to broadcast programs including FOOTBALL GAMES (the complete schedule -- home AND away) and the late night progressive stereo rock show (which you yourself constantly grok, and quite often from the WWUH control room). Later this year broadcasts of Hartt College concerts, faculty lectures and basketball games are

WWUH air controlmen number over 25, despite Father Holden's catatonic ululation that "WWUH's on the air engineers are a junior high school student and a Ward graduate." (And what's wrong with being a Ward Grad? A hidden sneer here, mayhap? -- Indeed the way for the chief representative of the student body of the University of Hartford to talk about one of his school affiliates.)

The equipment after being repaired and serviced, was returned upon request. (No mention has ever been made about the countless amounts of personal equipment loaned by staffers to

building the station.) The WWUH-Lipman Motors News Car has indeed been used to move "furniture." We moved a couch out of the old WWUH office (Room 328) after the station had been built. This was installed so we could work night and day while building WWUH. After construction we moved in our "New Furniture", (Control, News and Announce Room woodwork --tables.

SFA Elections

Last week the Student-Faculty Association appointed an elections Committee to oversee the fall term elections of the SFA. Consisting of Camille Lane, Jean Hunter and Richard Pronovost, the Committee set October 15 and 16 as the date for the elections for all now vacant seats. At present, both seats in the Engineering School, one seat each in Music, Art, Education and Business, and three seats in Arts and Arts and Sciences are vacant.

All petitions must be received in the SFA office by 3:00 P.M. Monday, October 7. And all prospective candidates must attend the SFA meeting of October 8 in room F of the Campus Center. Campaigning will begin Tuesday, October 8, after the SFA meeting at which all candidates will be certified as able to run.

More on Olefsky

Hartt College has a new 'cello professor; Paul Olefsky, world renowned 'cellist. To find out more, about just who he is, I spoke to a couple of his pupils, and to Mr. Olefsky himself.

Camillio Manricks of Ceylon met Mr. Olefsky in Ceylon when Mr. was playing with the orcestra there. When he announced he would be conducting Master Classes at the American Embassy, many of the 'cellists came to audition. Camillio came to America at Mr. Olefsky's request July 1967 to study with him; first at the Peabody Institute in Maryland, and now at Hartt. Camillio has had the unique privilege of spending the last summer with Mr. Olefsky on his farm in Massachusetts. He told how stunned he was when he awoke at 7 AM this summer to the sounds of Mr. Olefsky and 'cello, playing scales. At first they were deathly slow and with utmost precision. He listened to the process of increasing the tempo by degrees until finally he reached a fiery tempo that nobody but the very cream of violincellists can handle. The fact is, such a great 'cellist as Olefsky still takes the time and effort to do his own practicing the exact same way he recommends to all of his students. We both agreed that

that was probably one of the factors that makes him the real professional he is.

Very impressing is the high regard in which Mr. Olefsky's pupils hold him as a teacher. Juan Rios, a student from Caracas, Venezuela, stressed how Mr. Olefsky taught his students about every aspect of the violincello, not only technique and repertoire, but also such considerations as the 'cello itself and all its parts. Juan felt Mr. Olefsky loved his music very much, and would certainly stay at Hartt just to study with him. Camillio was very excited about the fact that Mr. Olefsky had a valuable exercise for every technical problem: even the difficult to teach vibrato.

When asked whether or not Mr. Olefsky's busy traveling schedule interfered with his pupil's progress at Hartt both Juan and Camillio answered that it did not. It seems Mr. Olefsky is at Hartt about three out of five days a week anyway.

I was impressed with Mr. Olefsky's apparent generosity with his private music collection, his time, and his effort towards his students.

Camillio Manricks related a more personal side to Mr. Olefsky. He told me of his passion for antiques. There was the story of the time Camillio and Mr. Olefsky found an old couch in a dump around Orange, Massachusetts. Mr. Olefsky took an immediate liking to this couch. He strapped it to his pink and black 1956 Cadillac and drove it to a re-upholsterer. The junk couch turned out to be a rare and valuable antique which now is probably in his New York apartment.

Everyone I spoke to expressed such enthusiasm about Paul Olefsky and indicated what an enthusiastic person he is himself. Mr. Olefsky seems to like Hartt as much as Hartt likes him. He was pleased with the audience at his recital here recently. He said it was alert and responsive. Mr. Olefsky is quite pleased to be at Hartt at all. He said he finds the school alive and the students and faculty very stimulated. He called it one of the best music schools in the world. We are probably luckier at Hartt than we imagine to have such a dynamic addition to our family, and we hope to see him asked to stay.

Faculty Appointments

Another chapter has been added to the continuing story of additions to the faculty at the University of Hartford. Three more professors have been added; Richard Breslow, a specialist in solid state physics, Thomas W. Sharpless, whose field is organic chemistry, and Dr. John R. Hewitt, associate

professor of advertising.

Breslow, a graduate of Lafayette College, has just completed his doctorate at the University of Connecticut. He has worked

for Combustion Engineering, in Windsor, and at UConn as a research assistant. He will be teaching General College Physics, Optics, and Modern Physics.

Sharpless transferred from Swarthmore College to the University of Miami, where he received a B.S. in chemistry, with a minor in mathematics, in 1961. He then spent two years with his wife in the Philippines, where he taught high school science and physics as a member of the Peace Corps.

Returning to the United States, he enrolled in a doctoral program in organic chemistry at the University of Florida, and worked as a graduate teaching assistant. He will be teaching Organic Chemistry at U of H.

Hewitt, former advertising executive with Sears Roebuck & Co., comes to Hartford from the faculty of Ohio University. Previous to that he was an adjunct instructor in advertising at the University of Illinois. He received his Masters in Business Administration from Sacramento State College, his Ph.D. at the University of Illinois. He is a member of the American Marketing Association.

O'Meara Interview

The 11th District Democratic candidate for the Connecticut House of Representatives was on campus for an interview this week. He is the first candidate for office in this state to come out "100% in support" of the proposed re-

duction in the minimum voting age. He has pledged himself to work "actively and tirelessly" in that regard.

Brian O'Meara, a political freshman, says he is answering the call of the late President Kennedy to the political service of the people. He thinks that every voice "could be heard if made heard".

O'Meara does not believe that the "older politicians, brought up in a tight rein era" can supply the answers necessary in today's society. He would like to get all voices involved in politics, including those of youth. He warned of the possibility of the bi-partisan commission's "button-holing for further study" the proposal concerning the voting age.

On civil liberties, a concern for most students today, O'Meara said "dissent is healthy", and there must always be "room for dissent". Civil liberties stop, he said, "when they are injurious to all parties, as in the case of open insurrection, when the prime goal is to destroy". The results of this sort of action were said to be "scorched earth and not creativity"

He commented, with respect to the Democratic War of Chicago, that "select groups of students didn't have the group's best interests at heart", and wished only to create havoc with the large groups of people present. He also cited "evidences of unrestraint on the part of policemen".


He called for "standards of action" because people are getting hurt" because of the lack of standards. He mentioned that to be "hit by a billy-club hurts, but it hurts a policeman to be hit by a brick too".

With specific regard to young people, O'Meara said society in general, and politics in specific, doesn't "give the young people credit for what they're doing". He believes the youth of the country is "active in politics", and "accepting the challenge" laid down by Kennedy.

Editor's Note: Mr. O'Meara is not an extremely important candidate in the upcoming elections, but he is one who has the interest of youth at heart, as evidenced by his coming to the U of H campus to solicit the viewpoints of students on the issues of the day. Steel Steed Stolen!

Last week around ten-thirty on the morning of September 25, a UH student's car was stolen from a campus parking lot. The autoheisters were four or five teen-age boys. NEWS that he was alerted by a friend that his (Fahey's) car was receiving meddling. Fahey did not emerge unscathed from the incident since something was stolen. . . a valuable portable radio from the glove compartment.

Why Chevy's? Some people seem to think they are easier to start by the crossing-of-the-wires met-hod than other makes. Or maybe there is a ready-market needing Chevy parts.

At any rate, if a student locks his car today, it might very well mean he will have a car to lock tomorrow.

Hawks Dump New Haven 30-13

Last Friday night at Dillon Stadium before 1100 fans, the red and white Hawk flew high in the form of Peter Fritsch as the University of Hartford defeated New Haven 30-13. To say the least the victory was very impressive especially since the Hawks had not previously scrimmaged under game conditions.

Our boys took the opening kickoff up to their 35 yard line. After
giving the ball up on downs past
midfield, New Haven gave it a
try and was forced to purt. They
didn't count however, or Scarsdale's Art Lewis who returned
the punt to the New Haven 23
yard line while displaying some
fine broken field running.

Hero Pete Fritsch took a handoff from quarterback Jurist and
swept left for a 21 yard run to
the 2 yard line. John DiPrato
went off tackle for the score,
but the TD was called back for
illegal procedure. The scarlet and
white were not to be denied as Bob
Jurist rolled to his right behind
solid blocking and passed to
Fritsch in the end zone for the
first of his three scores.

After the kickoff, New Haven quarterback, Dan Kearns passed 60 yards to Mike Kraus which put New Haven on Hartford's 8 yard line. If New Haven showed our boys anything it was the fine arm which Kearns had, Kearns kept up his one man show as he swept right to knot the score at 6-6. New Haven converted and led for the first time in the game 7-6. After receiving the ensuing kick-

off, Hartford droye downfield, but was stopped short of a first down on the opposition's 2.

In the second period the Hawks began to play the ball Coach Worth knew they could play against the South-staters. Bud Urban caught a 26 yard Jurist pass and ended up on New Haven's 27. End Richie Aldinger then took a, "quickie" over the middle for 10 more yards. But penalties and lack of blocking plagued the Hawks in the next few plays. Jurist was dropped behind the line of scrimmage several times. New Haven took over and began to drive like they meant

to score again, but Pete Fritsch surprised everyone, New Haven most of all, by intercepting a Kearns' pass and returning it to their 28 yard line. This completely changed the momentum of the game.

A pass to Hartigan put the ball on the 2 yard line, Fritsch ran his "32 play" in for the score and Hartford led 12-7.

The Hawks began from here on to play a tough brand of defense which kept New Haven off balance for the rest of the evening. Led by linemen Gernat, linebacker Greenberg and tackle Rotondo, who kept New Haven's Kearns on his backside, the Hawks took over on their 30 yard line:

It was here that New Haven came up with the "luck" play of the year. Kearns unleashed one of his patented bombs to Kraus, and while Hawk Paul Britto was neck and neck with him the pass bounced off his shoulder pads and into Kraus' hands for the Charger's second and final score. The at-

New Haven kicked off and Peter Fritsch, the husky fullback electrified the crowd by taking the kickoff 78 yards for a touchdown. The feat thrilled everyone and was the proverbial "icing on the cake." The halftime score was 18-13 in favor of Hartford, This reporter was sitting on the Hawk bench throughout the game and al-



though the score was close, several players were already predicting a rout because "they're not doing anything out there; no blocking or anything." Someone else called out that "They're the dirtiest excuse for a football team I've ever played against." The Charger's defense had a bad habit of ignoring the referee's whistle. The Hawks offset this problem just by having Paul Gernat, middle guard in the game.

The second half saw Marc Sommer alternating with freshman Bob Jurist.
